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Section 1 - Management Plan

The Board of Directors of the Refugio Groundwater Conservation District adopted a revised management plan on April 17, 2023. A copy of the plan is located on the website of the district at the following web address: <https://www.rgcd.org/groundwater-policy>.

The management plan specifies the method for tracking progress in achieving the goals of the district. The management plans specifies that the staff of the district will prepare and present an annual report to the board of directors regarding the performance of the district in achieving management goals and objectives for each fiscal year. The report will be presented within 180 days following the completion of each fiscal year.

The management plan establishes the goals, objectives, and performance standards by which the district evaluates performance. Goals related to providing the most efficient use of groundwater, controlling and preventing waste of groundwater, addressing conjunctive surface water management issues, addressing natural resource issues, addressing drought

conditions, addressing conservation, and addressing the desired future conditions were established by the board of directors.

Below is a list of management goals, programs, projects, and the assessment of the performance of the district during the fiscal year. The assessment of performance by the district relies upon the evaluation of the associated projects established for the fiscal year and the resulting records and data developed through those projects and tasks.

Section 2 - Review of Management Plan Goals and Assessment of Achievement

Based on the review of each management plan goal and associated performance standards, the district fully achieved the 7 objectives and partially achieved 1 established within the management plan of the district during the fiscal year ending September 30, 2025.

Management Plan Goal 1 - Providing the Most Efficient Use of Groundwater

Goal 1: Providing the most efficient use of groundwater.

Objective 1: Develop and maintain a program for processing permitting requests submitted to the district and tracking well registrations and permits issued by the district authorizing groundwater production during the fiscal year.

Performance Standard: The district will summarize within the annual report 1) the status of pending permitting requests, 2) the number of wells registered by the district, and 3) the volume of groundwater authorized to be produced under production permits issued by the district, as of the last day of the preceding fiscal year.

Discussion of Information relevant to Assessing the Performance

Summary of Permitting Requests by Status:

The district received 3 production permit renewal requests (ARPs) and initiated 6 permitting request cases (PRCs) during the fiscal year. The district had 1 permitting request cases pending at the end of the fiscal year.

Summary of Wells Registered by the District:

The district received 11 well registration applications (ARWs) and 45 Notices of Intent to Drill a Well (NIDWs) during the fiscal year. As of September 30, 2025, the District had recorded 1,132 wells within its well registration database with 220 wells fully registered by well registration applications.

Summary of Authorized Groundwater Production:

Based on a review of the database registry of production permit areas, 20 production permits issued by the district were active with

a cumulative authorization of groundwater production totaling 1,814.76 acre-feet per year.

Objective 1: Develop and maintain a program to monitor the water quality of at least twelve (12) water wells within the district per year.

Performance Standard: The district will summarize within the annual report 1) the number of wells monitored and 2) the water quality measurements collected during the preceding fiscal year.

Discussion of Information relevant to Assessing the Performance of the District during the Fiscal Year relative to the Objective:

The district collected 6 water quality field measurements and 2 water quality samples for lab analysis during Fiscal Year 2024.

The average recorded field measurement of conductivity was 1,290 µmhos/cm from water wells within the county during Fiscal Year 2024.

The average recorded field measurement of total dissolved solids was 0.839 g/L from water wells within the county during Fiscal Year 2024.

The district collected 5 water quality field measurements and 0 water quality samples for lab analysis during Fiscal Year 2025.

The average recorded field measurement of conductivity was 1,315 µmhos/cm from water wells within the county during Fiscal Year 2025.

The average recorded field measurement of total dissolved solids was 0.855 g/L from water wells within the county during Fiscal Year 2025.

The average recorded field measurement of total dissolved solids was 0.839 g/L from water wells within the county during Fiscal Year 2025.

The district received 1 water quality lab reports during the fiscal year.

The district recorded a total dissolved solids lab measurement of 1,590 g/L and a conductivity lab measurement of 2,770 µmhos/cm from a water well within the county during Fiscal Year 2025. The ratio between to total dissolved solids to conductivity is 0.57 g/L per µmhos/cm.

Management Plan Goal 7 - Addressing the Desired Future Conditions

Goal 7: Addressing the desired future conditions adopted by the district under Section 36.108.

Objective 1: Develop and maintain a program to monitor the water level of at least twelve (12) water wells within the district per year.

Performance Standard: The district will summarize within the annual report 1) the number of wells monitored and 2) the water level measurements collected during the preceding fiscal year.

Discussion of Information relevant to Assessing the Performance of the District during the Fiscal Year relative to Objective 1:

The District collected 22 separate water level measurements from water wells within Refugio County during Fiscal Year 2024.

The average water level of wells measured during the fiscal year was 31.8 feet below the surface during Fiscal Year 2024.

The District collected 13 separate water level measurements from water wells within Refugio County during Fiscal Year 2025.

The average water level of wells measured during the fiscal year was 26.8 feet below the surface during Fiscal Year 2025.

Objective 2: Analyze aquifer monitoring information to evaluate achievement of the desired future conditions of the district based on information available during the fiscal year.

Performance Standard: The district will summarize within the annual report 1) the aquifer monitoring information and 2) the conclusions regarding the achievement of the desired future conditions of the district during the preceding fiscal year.

Discussion of Information relevant to Assessing the Performance of the District during the Fiscal Year relative to Objective 2:

The average water level depth of wells with recorded measurements for FY2000 was 24.9 feet below the surface.

The average water level depth of wells with recorded measurements for FY2023 was 36.6 feet below the surface.

The average water level depth of wells with recorded measurements for FY2024 was 34.4 feet below the surface.

The average water level depth of wells with recorded measurements for FY2025 was 28.8 feet below the surface.

The district, based on the report developed by Intera titled *Application of Geostatistical Techniques to Interpret Measured 2024 and 2025 Water Levels* indicate the following:

- water levels in the Chicot Aquifer of the Gulf Coast Aquifer System in Refugio County have decreased by 6.3 feet (i.e., drawdown condition) in calendar year 2025 relative to year 2000.
- water levels in the Evangeline Aquifer of the Gulf Coast Aquifer System in Refugio County have decreased by 4.8 feet (i.e., drawdown condition) in calendar year 2025 relative to year 2000.
- water levels of the Chicot and Evangeline Aquifers of the Gulf Coast Aquifer System in Refugio County, combined, have decreased by 3.6 feet (i.e., drawdown condition) in calendar year 2025 relative to year 2000.

The 5-year rolling average of change in water level depths for the Chicot and Evangeline Aquifers since calendar year 2000 based on the report developed by Intera titled *Application of Geostatistical Techniques to Interpret Measured 2024 and 2025 Water Levels* is -6.3 feet (i.e., drawdown condition).

The desired future condition for Groundwater Management Area 15 is expressed as a maximum drawdown between January 2000 and December 2080. The county-specific desired future condition for Refugio County is "5 feet of drawdown of the Gulf Coast Aquifer System."

Based on water level trends within Refugio County, the district concludes that the condition of the Gulf Coast Aquifer within Refugio County is in compliance with the district's desired future condition.

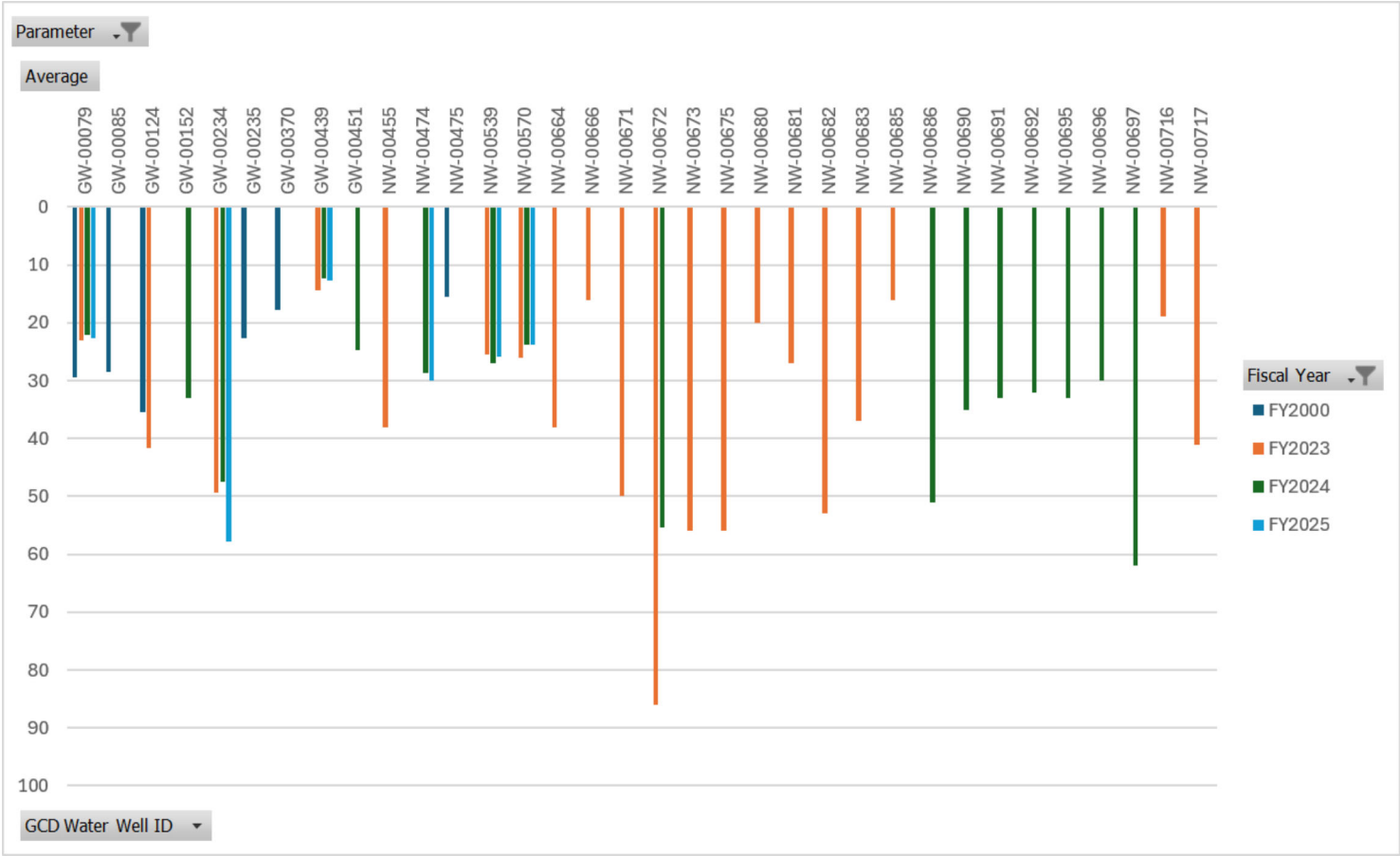

On October 7, 2024, Mr. Richard Shaw contacted the district concerned about a plan to drill a well for Woodsboro in close proximity to his property. Staff have contacted the project manager, Mr. Hector Castaneda of Ardurra, regarding the project and recommendation that staff strongly encourages the owner of the proposed well to seek and obtain a production permit prior to commencing any drilling activities to avoid difficulties or the potential inability to use the well for the intended purpose at the intended production rates. Mr. Castaneda notified staff that he would contact Mr. Benavides to coordinate regarding a production permit application.

Regarding Groundwater Production Report Processing for CY2023.

5.2 – Incentivizing Aquifer Monitoring Cooperation

Meeting Discussion: Mr. Andruss explained the purpose of the groundwater monitoring program is to facilitate the coordination of activities and tasks completed by staff, consultants, and contractors to evaluate the condition of the groundwater resources within the county.

The management plan of the district establishes the following objectives to be achieved through the implementation of the groundwater monitoring program:

Management Plan Goal 4 - Addressing Natural Resource Issues

Objective 1: Develop and maintain a program to monitor the water quality of at least twelve (12) water wells within the district per year.

Management Plan Goal 7 - Addressing the Desired Future Conditions

Objective 1: Develop and maintain a program to monitor the water level of at least twelve (12) water wells within the district per year.

Objective 2: Analyze aquifer monitoring information to evaluate achievement of the desired future conditions of the district based on information available during the fiscal year.

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On October 20, 2023, the Board of Directors authorized the implementation of a project to incentivize cooperation between well owners and the district regarding aquifer monitoring through the payment of access fee of \$50.00 per monitoring event to cooperating well owners. The funding was limited to \$5,000.00 during Fiscal Year 2024.

After the approval of the incentivization by the Board and the boards of Calhoun County GCD and Victoria County GCD, staff mailed out approximately 100 letters to property owners in the 3-county region regarding the incentivization project. Staff received very limited interest in the offer.

Board Action: Mr. Borden moved to authorize the general manager to implement a project to incentivize cooperation with the district regarding aquifer monitoring limiting financial incentives to \$100.00 per monitoring event at a well and \$5,000.00 during the fiscal year. Mr. Biery seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

5.3 – TWDB Grant Program

Meeting Discussion: Mr. Andruss explained the Texas Water Development Board has established a program to facilitate water conservation in agriculture called the Agricultural Water Conservation Grants Program. Through the program, TWDB provides funding to entities such as GCDs to promote water conservation. Numerous GCDs across the state have secured funds for this purpose with meter cost-sharing being a common example of the type of program that is funded.

This grants program could represent an opportunity for the district to promote water conservation through awareness of pumping impacts while simultaneously improving the district's monitoring efforts of the groundwater resources in the county if a project for cost-sharing aquifer monitoring equipment were submitted and approved.

In particular, a program to fund the procurement and installation of the WellIntel monitoring system at strategic locations around the county would enable groundwater producers, nearby landowners, and staff of district to assess groundwater production impacts in real-time.

Board Action: Mr. Borden moved to authorize the general manager to submit a joint grant application with CCGCD, VCGCD, and TGCD to TWDB for advanced aquifer monitoring equipment at well sites used to produce groundwater for agricultural purposes. Ms. Rose seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

The revisions to the rules primarily include clarifications regarding the foundational policies of the district including the clarification regarding 1) non-historic use well offset from property lines, 2) maintaining well registration information with the district, 3) permit renewals associated with proposed (non-existing) wells, 4)

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procedures related to permit amendments, 5) production limitations for non-historic use, and 6) the elimination of unnecessary notice requirements related to notices of need to file suit in association with violations.

Board Action: Mr. Borden moved to open the rulemaking hearing at approximately 6:20 PM. Mr. Biery seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Borden moved to close the rulemaking hearing after receiving no public comment on the proposed rules. Mr. Snyder seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

The legislature revised the transfer fee limitations in Chapter 36 of the Texas Water Code:

Sec. 36.122. TRANSFER OF GROUNDWATER OUT OF DISTRICT.

(e) Except as provided by Subsection (e-1), the district may impose an export fee or surcharge using one of the following methods:

- (1) a fee negotiated between the district and the exporter;
- (2) for a tax-based district, a rate not to exceed 20 cents for each thousand gallons of water exported from the district; or
- (3) for a fee-based district, a rate not to exceed the greater of 20 cents for each thousand gallons or a 50 percent surcharge, in addition to the district's production fee, for water exported from the district.

(e-1) Effective January 1, 2024, the maximum allowable rate a district may impose for an export fee or surcharge under Subsection (e)(2) or (e)(3) increases by three percent each calendar year.

Effective January 1, 2024, the maximum rate increased to \$0.206 cents per thousand gallons. On January 1, 2025, the maximum rate will increase to \$0.212

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cents per thousand gallons. These rates equal \$67.125 per acre-foot of groundwater transferred out of the district and \$69.129 per acre-foot of groundwater transferred out of the district, respectively.

Staff have developed revisions to the fee schedule to update the fees to be assessed for the transfer of groundwater out of the district and establish fees to be assessed for excess groundwater production.

Board Action: Mr. Borden moved to adopt the draft fee schedule by resolution, as drafted. Ms. Rose seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Item 2. Receive public comments.

Mr. Borden offered to accept public comments from attendees.

Item 3. Consideration of and possible action on matters related to groundwater management including the efforts and activities of the District regarding permitting, complaints, investigations, violations, and enforcement cases associated with permitting.

Topic 3.1 - Report

Mr. Andruss proved the following reports:

Regarding Well Registration Processing for FY2025.

As of January 17, 2025, staff had received 3 well registration applications (ARWs) since October 1, 2024.

As of January 17, 2025, staff had received 12 Notices of Intent to Drill a Well (NIDWs) since October 1, 2024.

Regarding Production Permit Renewal Processing for FY2025.

As of January 17, 2025, staff had received 0 production permit renewal requests (ARPs) since October 1, 2024.

Regarding Permit Processing for FY2025.

As of January 17, 2025, staff had initiated 2 permitting request case (PRCs) since October 1, 2024.

As of January 17, 2025, staff had 3 permitting request cases pending.

As of January 17, 2025, staff had 20 active or approved production permits recorded in the permitting database with a combined amount of authorized groundwater production per year of 1,891 acre-feet.

Regarding Groundwater Production Report Processing for CY2024.

As of January 17, 2025, staff had processed 9 groundwater production reports for the preceding calendar year since October 1, 2024.

As of January 17, 2025, staff had recorded groundwater production reports for 9 water wells reporting 4.76 acre-feet of groundwater production during CY 2024. (TWDB estimated the volume of groundwater produced for rural domestic, livestock, mining, and rig supply exempt uses in Refugio County in Year 2020 was 580 acre-feet. See: TWDB - Projected Exempt Groundwater Use Estimates.).

Regarding Manage Investigations related to Permitting Violations for FY2025.

As of January 17, 2025, staff had initiated 0 investigations related to groundwater management (i.e., permitting) since October 1, 2024.

As of January 17, 2025, staff had 0 active investigations related to groundwater management (i.e., permitting).

Staff will review all expired permits and unresolved permitting matters during the fiscal year, while processing permits due to expire during the fiscal year, to ensure all well owners and operators comply with the requirements established under the rules of the district regarding production permitting and production reporting.

Regarding Manage Enforcement Cases related to Permitting Violations for FY2025.

As of January 17, 2025, the Board had initiated 0 enforcement case violations related to groundwater management (i.e., permitting) since October 1, 2024.

Topic 3.2 - Permit Hearing - PRC-20241212-01

Mr. Andruss provided the following discussion:

Mayor Kay Roach for The Town of Woodsboro seeks, under permitting request case PRC-20241212-01, a standard-capacity non-historic-use production permit authorizing the production of groundwater from a non-grandfathered well

system for municipal uses at rates not to exceed 499 gallons per minute or 249 acre-feet per year. The subject well system is located on a 2.3-acre tract of land near the intersection of 2nd Street and Johnson Street, and a 0.3-acre tract of land near the intersection of Summit Avenue and Chaparral Street, in the Town of Woodsboro, Refugio County, Texas.

On December 31, 2024, May Kay Roach submitted the applications and supplemental information to the District.

The applications and supplemental information associated with this permitting request case are considered administratively complete and contain sufficient information evaluate the request relative to the rules of the district. On January 2, 2025, the district notified the applicant that the associated application(s) was considered administratively complete.

Per Rule 6.1(6). the applicant requested the district consider all contiguous land within the boundary of its certificate of convenience and necessity (CCN) to be under its control for the purposes of evaluating the spacing requirements, production limitations, and performance conditions of the district. The calculated area of the contiguous tracts of groundwater control is 583.89 acres. A well proposed to be drilled, constructed, and equipped to produce groundwater at a rate of 499 GPM should be offset from the nearest property line by 499 feet per RGCD Rule 2.2(2).

Rule 2.2(2) states: "A person drilling or having drilled a non-grandfathered well or a replacement well for a non-grandfathered well that is not a deep-saline well shall locate the non-grandfathered well in a position that is offset from the boundary of the subject tracts of contiguous ownership of land by at least one foot (1 foot) of separation per one gallon per minute of production capacity of the non-grandfathered well."

The rules of the district provided for reducing the offset if written waivers are obtained from landowners that would be encroached upon given the proposed production rate and location.

Rule 2.2(4) states: "A person drilling or having drilled a non-grandfathered well or replacement well for a non-grandfathered well may locate the well in a position that encroaches upon spacing requirements from the property of any landowner or any owner of groundwater resources from whom a written waiver of the spacing requirements is obtained provided the waiver contains: 4.1. the printed name and signature of the landowner and the owner of groundwater resources or the authorized agent of the landowner and the owner of groundwater resources, and 4.2. states that the landowner and the owner of

groundwater resources have no objection to the proposed position of the non-grandfathered well or the replacement well for a non-grandfathered well."

The application includes waivers of spacing requirements from the two landowners identified by the applicant as being encroached upon under Rule 2.2(s): Donald E. Kingsbury and RCDM Enterprises, LLC.

Based on the review of the information provided within the associated application and supplemental information provided by the applicant, management has determined that the request is consistent with the policies and rules of the district. Accordingly, the district has not notified the applicant of the intent of the district to contested the permitting request.

On January 2, 2025, the district completed the public notice process for the permitting request case.

As of January 17, 2025, the District had not received any notices of intent to contest the permitting request.

Board Action: Mr. Borden moved to 1) cancel the permit hearing and proceed with the permitting case as an uncontested matter; and 2) issue a standard-capacity production permit to the Town of Woodsboro for the subject well system under permitting request case PRC-20241212-01 with the following conditions and the requirements established in the rules of the district now in effect:

Authorized Groundwater Production Purpose: Municipal Uses;
Authorized Groundwater Production Rate: 499 gallons per minute;
Authorized Groundwater Production: 249 acre-feet per year; and
Expiration Date: July 31, 2030.

Mr. Snyder seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Topic 3.3 - Investigation of Unreported Groundwater Production for Irrigation

Mr. Andruss provided the following discussion:

While reviewing estimates of groundwater production related to irrigation for the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB), staff identified a significant discrepancy between 1) the volume of groundwater production reported to the District for years 2022 and 2023 and 2) the volume of groundwater production for irrigation estimated by TWDB. In Jackson County, the reported groundwater production across all types of permitted uses (including irrigation) totals 25,816 AF while the estimate of groundwater use for irrigation is 61,961 AF, a difference of 36,145 AF.

Based on rice crop information retrieved from GMU's CropScape and USDA's CroplandCROS, it appears that rice irrigation may be substantially under reported to TGCD. This may be the case for RGCD as well. The image below illustrates those areas with rice crops without reported groundwater production

in close proximity. The likely unreported groundwater production associated with these areas likely account for the significant difference between your estimate and TGCD's reported production amounts.

Board Action: Mrs. Rose moved to authorize the general manager to initiate an investigation to resolve potential violations associated with any confirmed instances of failure to report groundwater production associated with rice irrigation. Mr. Biery seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Topic 3.4 - Brackish Groundwater Assessment

Mr Andruss provided the following discussion:

With the adoption of the revised rules of the district for Refugio GCD, Calhoun County GCD, and Refugio GCD, which includes a framework for incentivizing production permitting in deep saline groundwater zones, staff has requested a cost estimate from Dr. Young of Intera for extending the technical work completed for VCGCD (See: <https://www.vcgcd.org/groundwater-research>) used to support the development of its deep-saline production zone rules. The work completed for VCGCD by Intera cost approximately \$55,000.00. Dr. Young estimated the cost at \$20,000 per county.

Board Action: Mr. Snyder moved to instruct the general manager to obtain a proposal from Intera for the characterization of brackish groundwater resources in Refugio County from Dr. Young of Intera. Mr. Biery seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Item 4 - Consideration of and possible action on matters related to groundwater protection including complaints, investigations, violations, and enforcement cases related to groundwater contamination and waste.

Mr. Andruss provided the following discussion:

As of January 17, 2025, the U.S. Drought Monitor (<https://www.drought.gov/states/texas/county/refugio>) indicates that 100% of Refugio County was experiencing abnormally dry or drought conditions. As of January 17, 2025, drought condition information related to the district and the surrounding region of Texas collected from the Water Data for Texas website <https://www.waterdatafortexas.org/drought/> indicates that all portions of Refugio County are experiencing abnormally dry or drought conditions.

Regarding Synoptic Aquifer Monitoring for FY2025.

As of January 17, 2025, staff had collected 0 water level measurements since October 1, 2024.

Topic 5.2 - Consideration of and possible action on matters related to groundwater monitoring.

Mr. Andruss provided the following discussion:

On July 15, 2024, the Board accepted the proposal from Intera regarding the analysis of CY2023 water levels and authorized agreed to share the cost of the with the work with Victoria County GCD, Calhoun County GCD, and Texana GCD at a cost not to exceed \$4,500.00.

On December 18, 2024, Dr. Young submitted the report and presentation on the analysis of CY2023 water levels using the geostatistical approach for Victoria County, Calhoun County, Refugio County, and Jackson County.

Based on Table 4 of the Intera's report, water levels in Refugio County in the calendar year 2023 for the Chicot and the Evangeline Aquifers, combined, have declined 7.3 feet since the calendar year 2000. The water levels in the Chicot Aquifer, alone, have declined 7.5 feet in Refugio County and the water levels in the Evangeline Aquifer, alone, have declined 8.4 feet since the calendar year 2000.

The average water level change for the Chicot and Evangeline Aquifer in Refugio County between CY2019 and CY2023 is 5.48 feet. The image below illustrates the calculated water level changes overtime.

The spatial representation of the calculated water level change with in Refugio County in CY2023 illustrates a significant decline in water levels centered at the tri-county intersection of Refugio, Bee, and Goliad Counties in both the Chicot and Evangeline Aquifers.

Staff of the district will investigate the significant declines identified near the northwestern border of Refugio County.

Board Action: Mr. Borden moved to 1) accept the report on the analysis of CY2023 water levels using the geostatistical approach submitted by Dr. Young of Intera, and 2) authorize the general manager to pay the district's share of the cost (\$4,500). Mr. Snyder seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Topic 5.3 - Water Quality Assessment Proposal

Mr Andruss provided the following discussion:

The Board has consistently expressed interest in groundwater quality impacts associated with groundwater production. In fact, the management plan of the district states

"The district will monitor aquifer conditions in and around Refugio County in order to monitor changing water levels and water quality of groundwater resources within Refugio County. The district will make periodic assessments of aquifer conditions and will report those conditions to the Board of Directors of the district and to the public."

Furthermore, the rules of the district address groundwater quality extensively including the following:

Rule 1.2 states "The board of directors shall adopt rules pursuant to the authority of Section 36.101, Texas Water Code, for the purpose of conserving, preserving, protecting, and recharging groundwater in the district in order to

control subsidence, prevent degradation of water quality, or prevent waste of groundwater, and protect the rights of owners of groundwater resources."

Rule 2.2(1) states "The district shall regulate the spacing of non-grandfathered wells and replacement wells in order to:

- 1.1. prevent or limit the drawdown of the water table or the reduction in artesian pressure,
- 1.2. prevent or limit interference between wells,
- 1.3. prevent or limit the degradation of water quality, or
- 1.4. prevent waste of groundwater."

Rule 6.1.1(4) states "The district shall limit the authorized groundwater production amount of a production permit for non-historic use of a non-exempt-use well to the degree the board of directors determines to be necessary to ensure the groundwater production from the subject well will not likely cause excessive water level declines within the district, excessive water quality changes of groundwater resources within the district, or significantly contribute to subsidence within the district."

In order to improve the ability of the district to evaluate changes to and impacts on groundwater quality, staff has obtained a proposal from Daniel B. Stephens and Associates, Inc. (DBSA) to study and document groundwater quality for Victoria, Calhoun, Refugio, and Jackson Counties as a jointly funded project of Victoria County GCD, Calhoun County GCD, Refugio GCD, and Texana GCD. As proposed the proposed work is estimated to cost approximately \$74,000.00, or \$18,500.00 per district.

Board Action: Mr. Snyder moved to 1) accept the proposal from Daniel B. Stephens and Associates, Inc. (DBSA) to study and document groundwater quality for Refugio, Victoria, Calhoun, and Jackson Counties and 2) authorize the general manager to authorize the work as proposed and cost-share in the expenses for the proposed work in an amount not to exceed \$74,000.00, contingent upon Texana GCD, Calhoun County GCD, and Victoria County GCD agreeing to the same. Mr. Biery seconded the motion. The motioned passed unanimously.

Item 6 - Consideration of and possible action on matters related to groundwater conservation.

This item was not discussed or acted upon during the meeting.

Item 7 - Consideration of and possible action on matters related to groundwater resource planning including Groundwater Management Area 15 Joint Planning and regional water planning.

The representatives of Groundwater Management Area 15 met on October 10, 2024, at 9:30 AM at the offices of the Evergreen Underground Water Control District and actively began the process for developing desired future conditions for GMA 15 with the assistance of its technical consultant, Dr. Young of Intera.

In order to clarify that reporting requirements apply to all wells used to produce groundwater used for purposes other than exempt-use purposes, regardless of any classification that may be applied to the registration of a well by the district, Rule 4.2 would benefit from the following revisions:

2. The owner of groundwater resources produced from a non-exempt-use well well that produced groundwater for non-exempt-use purposes shall report the volume of groundwater produced from the non-exempt-use well for the preceding calendar year to the district.
4. The owner of groundwater resources produced from a non-exempt-use well well that produced groundwater for non-exempt-use purposes shall report the volume of groundwater produced from the non-exempt-use well that is accurate within ten percent (10%) of the actual volume of groundwater produced by the non-exempt use during the calendar year.
5. The owner of groundwater resources produced from a non-exempt-use well well that produced groundwater for non-exempt-use purposes shall report the volume of groundwater produced from the non-exempt-use well for the previous calendar year (January 1 to December 31) during January of the current calendar year.
6. The owner of groundwater resources produced from a non-exempt-use well well that produced groundwater for non-exempt-use purposes shall report the volume of groundwater produced from the non-exempt-use well using a form provided by the district.
7. The owner of groundwater resources produced from a non-exempt-use well well that produced groundwater for non-exempt-use purposes shall include the following information when reporting the volume of groundwater produced from a non-exempt-use well:

Topic 8.4 - Director Compensation and Fees of Office

Mr. Andruss provided the following discussion:

On January 19, 2021, the Board of Directors adopted a resolution concerning fees of office.

Currently, the District compensates its directors for the performance of their duties under Chapter 36.060 of the Texas Water Code. See:

<https://statutes.capitol.texas.gov/Docs/WA/htm/WA.36.htm#36.060>. TWC 36.06 limits fees of office to not more than \$250 a day for each day the director actually spends performing the duties of a director and not more than \$9,000 a

year. These limits effectively limit directors to being compensated for no more than 36 days of service per year.

If the directors wish to seek an increase in the limits established under TWC 36.06 for fees for office, the Board would need to take action on this matter at the meetings to enable staff to coordinate with legislators for the possible filling of a bill during the regular legislative session beginning in January 2025.

In preparation for this matter, legal counsel has drafted a resolution for consideration by the Board.

Board Action: Mr. Biery moved to adopt the Resolution to Authorize Compensation for Directors as drafted by legal counsel and authorize staff to seek to coordinate with legislators for the possible filling of a bill during the regular legislative session beginning in January 2025 regarding the matter. Mr. Snyder seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

On March 19, 2025, the Victoria County Groundwater Conservation District submitted an application to the Texas Water Development Board for the Fiscal Year 2025 Agriculture Water Conservation Grants Program on behalf of the Victoria County Groundwater Conservation District, the Calhoun County Groundwater Conservation District, the Refugio Groundwater Conservation District, and the Texana Groundwater Conservation District (Cooperating Districts).

The Cooperating Districts propose through the (4-year) project to expand their aquifer monitoring efforts to include a four-year program to evaluate the impact of access to aquifer condition information on agricultural groundwater production within Victoria, Calhoun, Refugio, and Jackson Counties. The staff of the VCGCD will 1) deploy telemetry-equipped monitoring probes at agricultural sites to support the publication of real-time aquifer monitoring data similar to the information posted at <https://www.vcgcd.org/real-time-aquifer-monitoring-charts>, 2) gather detailed information via surveys from participating well operators regarding groundwater production, utilization of real-time aquifer monitoring data of local aquifer conditions, and 3) evaluate the effects of real-time aquifer monitoring data, if any, on groundwater production by participating groundwater producers.

The Cooperating Districts aim, through the implementation of the project, to facilitate the use of aquifer monitoring data in the decision-making processes of water well operators that 1) better balances a) the impacts associated with consuming groundwater resources and b) preserving groundwater resource for the future and 2) results in a quantifiable reduction of groundwater production.

The estimated cost of the project is \$240,112. The VCGCD is seeking a grant of \$179,200 for groundwater conservation efforts in Jackson, Victoria, Calhoun, and Refugio Counties.

The cost to the Cooperating District to implement the project during the 4-year project is estimated to total \$60,912.

- HB 4472 would create a permit exemption for wells incapable of producing more than 10,000 GPD (11.2 AFY) on properties smaller than 100 acres.
- HB 4896 **Author:** Garcia, Josey **Caption:** Relating to rules and reports related to brackish groundwater production zones.
- HB 4896 would eliminate the wastewater injection criteria that limits the creation of Designated Brackish Groundwater Production Zones (DBGPZs) which will likely dramatically increase the number and distribution of the zones, including in areas within Jackson, Victoria, Calhoun, and Refugio Counties. The creation of DBGPZs within the Jackson, Victoria, Calhoun, and Refugio Counties would effectively transfer the regulatory authority over substantial amounts of groundwater resources within Jackson, Victoria, Calhoun, and Refugio Counties from locally-elected officials of the corresponding GCDs to governor-appointed officials at TWDB via the TWDB's a) technical review of DBGPZ applications, b) TWDB's recommendations regarding monitoring, and c) TWDB's evaluation of DBGPZ monitoring reports to determine if the brackish groundwater production will cause unacceptable impacts on groundwater resources.
- SB 2658 **Author:** Perry **Caption:** Relating to an exemption from the requirement to obtain a permit from a groundwater conservation district for certain brackish groundwater wells. HB 5188 **Author:** Lopez, Janie **Caption:** Relating to an exemption from the requirement to obtain a permit from a groundwater conservation district for certain brackish groundwater wells.

On July 17, 2023, staff provided the following report: "on July 7, 2023, the district obtained the Affected Property Assessment Report (APAR Report) for the site associated with INV-20191202:1017 - Potential Contamination of Groundwater at Woodsboro Farmers Cooperative - Active. The report had been revised in February 2023.

On page 8 of the report, the following statements were made (emphasis added):

The analytical results from the 2022 sampling event detected no constituent concentrations in soil above applicable Tier 1 Residential PCLs for any constituent. Constituent concentrations in groundwater were detected above Tier 1 Residential PCLs in MW-1 for dieldrin and in MW-1, MW-2, MW-3, MW-4, and MW-5 for nitrate. All other constituent concentrations in groundwater were low to non-detectable and did not exceed Tier 1 Residential PCLs.

Based on the findings of this report, Ardurra does not recommend any remediation or excavation of soil.

Detected constituent concentrations in groundwater for dieldrin and nitrates are either laboratory estimated quantities or likely the result of previous agricultural use of the surrounding land. Additionally, the groundwater exposure pathway is not complete, as the first groundwater bearing unit is present at an average depth of 20-25 feet (an unlikely depth to be encountered by any Site excavation) and the first groundwater bearing unit is not used as a water resource in the area.

Ardurra recommends that the Remedy B standard be used to deed-restrict the first groundwater bearing unit at the site to prevent its future use as a water resource and quarterly groundwater monitoring for one year to monitor COC concentrations and determine trend in PCLE zones.

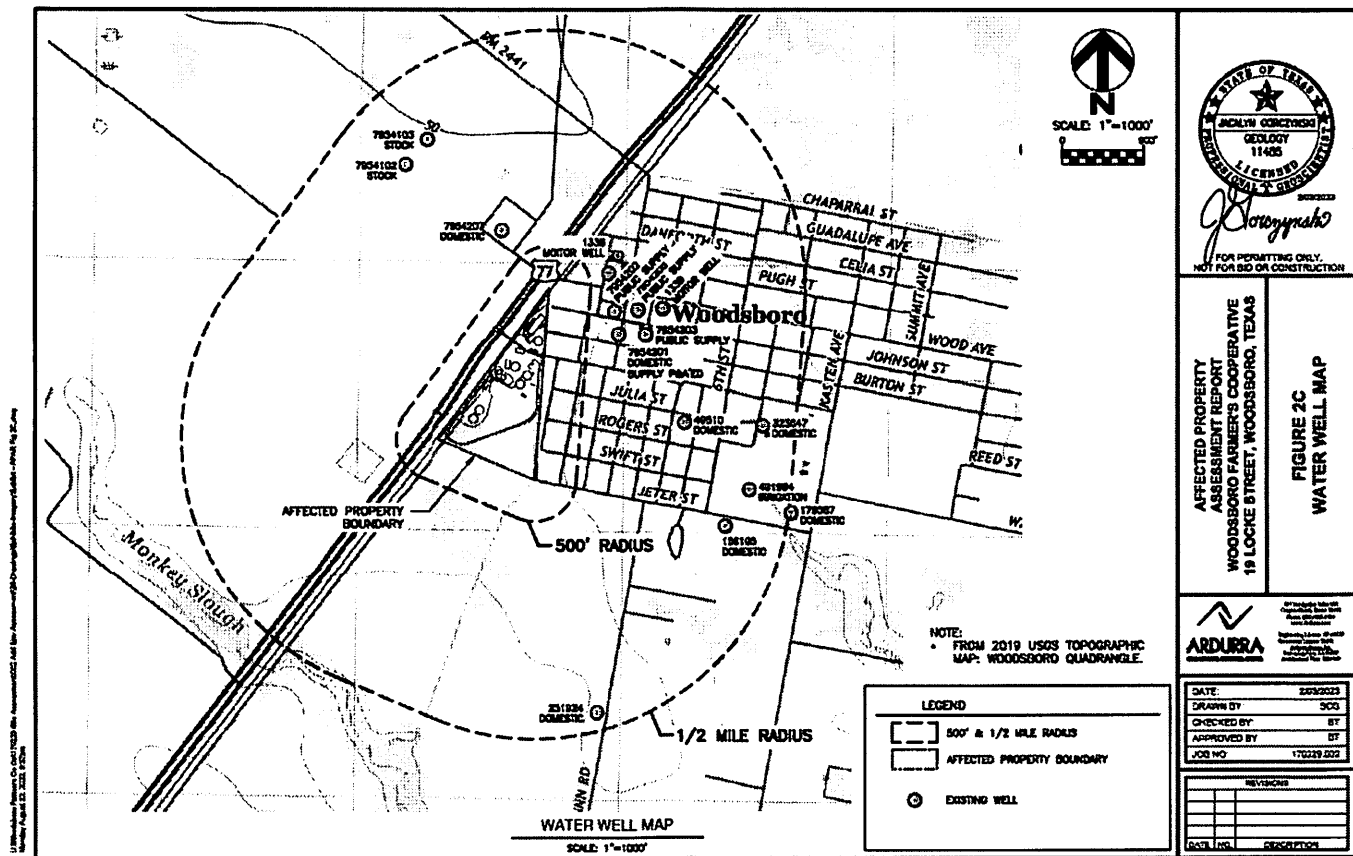

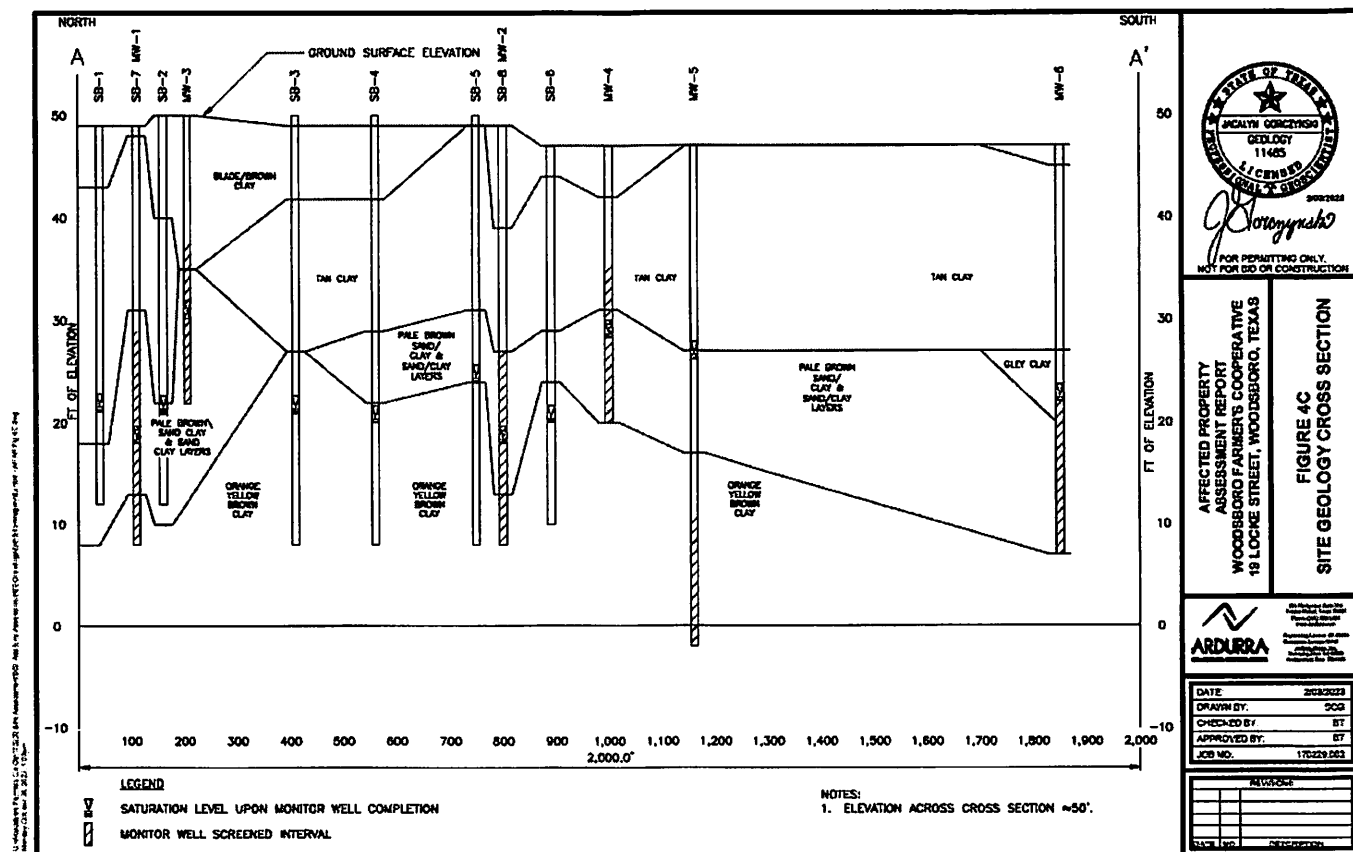

The mission of the Refugio Groundwater Conservation District is to develop sound water conservation and management strategies designed to conserve, preserve, protect, and prevent waste of groundwater resources for long-term sustainability within Refugio County for the benefit of the landowners, citizens, economy, and environment of Refugio County.

The management plan of the district states:

"For the purpose of managing the use of groundwater within Refugio County, the district may define sustainable use as the use of an amount of groundwater in Refugio County as a whole or any

management zone established by the district that does not exceed any of the following conditions:

1. the long-term average historical groundwater production from aquifers in Refugio County established by the district prior to the establishment of the desired future condition of aquifers in a groundwater management area in which the district is located; or
2. the desired future conditions of aquifers in Refugio County established by a groundwater management area in which the district is located; or
3. The amount of modeled available groundwater resulting from the establishment of a desired future aquifer condition by the district or a groundwater management area in which the district is located; or
4. the estimated long-term average historical amount of annual recharge of the aquifer or aquifer subdivision in which the use occurs as recognized by the district ; or
5. any other criteria established by the district as being a threshold of use beyond which further use of the aquifer or aquifer subdivision may result in a specified undesirable or injurious condition."

The desired future condition (DFC) for GMA 15 is expressed as a condition to not exceed an average drawdown of 13 feet in the Gulf Coast Aquifer within GMA 15 at the end of year 2080. The DFC for Refugio County is expressed as a condition to not exceed an average drawdown of 5 feet in the Gulf Coast Aquifer within GMA 15 at the end of year 2080.

The modeled available groundwater (MAG) of the Gulf Coast Aquifer within the Refugio County is estimated to be 5,858 acre-feet per year. This MAG value was developed using the Central Gulf Coast Groundwater Availability Model recalibrated by TWDB in 2004 (CGC-GAM).

As of April 15, 2025, staff had 20 active or approved production permits recorded in the permitting database with a combined amount of authorized groundwater production per year of 1,814.76 acre-feet. As of April 15, 2025, staff had recorded groundwater production reports for 39 water wells reporting 954 acre-feet of groundwater production during CY 2024. (TWDB estimated the volume of groundwater produced for rural domestic, livestock, mining, and rig supply exempt uses in Refugio County in Year 2020 was 580 acre-feet. See: TWDB - Projected Exempt Groundwater Use Estimates).

Based on Intera's report and presentation on the analysis of CY2023 water levels using the geostatistical approach for Jackson County, Victoria County, Calhoun County, and Refugio County, water levels in Refugio County in the calendar year 2023 for the Chicot and the Evangeline Aquifers, combined, have declined 7.3 feet since the calendar year 2000. The water levels in the Chicot Aquifer, alone, have declined 7.5 feet in Refugio County and the water levels in the Evangeline Aquifer, alone, have declined 8.4 feet since the calendar year 2000. The 5-year rolling average water level change for Refugio County (CY2019 - CY2023) is 5.5 feet of decline.

The representatives of Groundwater Management Area 15 have been asked to provide preliminary DFC statements for the portion of their territory within GMA 15, pumping scenarios for modeling groundwater production impacts at year 2080, and a set of water wells to be used in the assessment of socio-economic impacts.

In light of water level change data, recent groundwater production data, and recent and potential changes in the regulatory framework associated with brackish groundwater, the Board might consider submitting two preliminary DFC statements and related pumping scenarios for consideration. Several scenarios are offered for consideration:

Scenario 1: DFC Maintenance - preliminary Desired Future Condition for Refugio County expressed as a condition to not exceed an average drawdown of 5 feet in the Gulf Coast Aquifer, +/-3 feet, at the end of year 2080 with the previous pumping distribution used to develop the DFC for Refugio County.

Scenario 2: DFC Maintenance and Deep Saline Production - Desired Future Condition for Refugio County expressed as a condition to not exceed an average drawdown of 5 feet in the Chicot and Evangeline Aquifers, combined, +/- 3 feet, at the end of year 2080 with the previous pumping distribution used to develop the DFC for Refugio County unchanged and as a condition to not exceed an average drawdown of 20 feet in the Burkeville and Jasper Aquifers, combined at the end of year 2080 with the previous pumping distribution used to develop the DFC for Refugio County increased to 40,000 acre-feet per year in the southern portion of Refugio County.

Topic 7.3 - Evaluation of CSGC-GAM for District Uses

Mr. Andruss provided the following information:

Although the representatives of GMA 15 have decided, in coordination with TWDB staff, to use the Central Gulf Coast Groundwater Availability Model recalibrated by TWDB in 2004 (CGC-GAM) for evaluation desired future conditions during the current joint planning cycle instead of the draft Groundwater Availability Model for the Central and Southern Portions of Gulf Coast Aquifer System in Texas recalibrated in 2025 (draft CSGC-GAM), TWDB has indicated its intent is to use the draft CSGC-GAM for development of Modeled Available Groundwater (MAG) values. The MAG values are used by regional water planning groups for evaluation water management strategies and by GCDs to evaluate permitting requests. On April 10, 2025, the representatives of GMA 15 authorized Intera, as the technical consultant to the GMA, to evaluate the utility of the draft CSGC-GAM for joint planning purposes such as regional groundwater modeling, demonstration on DFC feasibility, and evaluating socio-economic impacts of a proposed DFC.

The GMA 15 evaluation will not assess the utility of the draft CSGC-GAM for GCD purposes such as developing district-level DFCs, evaluating aquifer impacts associated with production permit requests, assessing and predicting subsidence, assessing and predicting saltwater intrusion, or assessing and predicting the consequences of incentivizing deep saline groundwater production.

On April 21, 2025, Dr. Young of Intera submitted a proposal at management's request for the evaluation of the draft CSGC-GAM for district purposes for Refugio, Victoria, Calhoun, and Jackson Counties. The budget for the project is \$50,000, \$12,500 per district.

Board Action: Mrs. Rose moved to 1) accept and approve the project to evaluate the draft CSGC-GAM for district purposes for Refugio, Victoria, Calhoun, and Jackson Counties, and 2) authorize the general manager to pay associated invoices from VCGCD in an amount not to exceed \$12,500, contingent upon VCGCD, CCGCD, and TGCD approving the project and agreeing to cost share equally. Mr. Biery seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

"Texas Government Code section 552.012 requires elected or appointed public officials to complete an open records training course. The training requirement applies to:

1. a member of a multimember governmental body;
2. the governing officer of a governmental body that is headed by a single officer rather than by a multimember governing body; or
3. the officer for public information of a governmental body, without regard to whether the officer is elected or appointed to a specific term.

The law requires that the specified public officials complete the training course within 90 days of taking the oath of office or otherwise assuming the responsibilities of office. A public official may assign a public information coordinator to satisfy the training requirement for the public official if the coordinator is primarily responsible for administering the responsibilities of the public official or governmental body under the Public Information Act. The designated coordinator is required to complete the training course within 90 days of the date the coordinator assumes the duties as coordinator."

Sec. 2054.5191. CYBERSECURITY TRAINING REQUIRED: CERTAIN EMPLOYEES AND OFFICIALS.

(a) Each state agency shall identify state employees who use a computer to complete at least 25 percent of the employee's required duties. At least once each year, an employee identified by the state agency and each elected or appointed officer of the agency shall complete a cybersecurity training program certified under Section 2054.519.

(a-1) At least once each year, a local government shall:

(1) identify local government employees and elected and appointed officials who have access to a local government computer system or database and use a computer to perform at least 25 percent of the employee's or official's required duties; and

...

(2) require the employees and officials identified under Subdivision (1) to complete a cybersecurity training program certified under Section 2054.519.

State-certified training related to cybersecurity can be accessed from the website of the Texas Municipal League - Risk Pool (<https://info.tmlrp.org/cyber-security-training>).

The District does not have employees and none of the directors satisfy the condition under Sec.

2054.5191(a-1)(1). The district obtains services from employees of the Victoria County Groundwater

Conservation District via an interlocal agreement. The employees of the Victoria County Groundwater Conservation District are required to complete a cybersecurity training program certified under Section 2054.519.

Public Funds Investment Act and Public Funds Collateral Act Training

The individual that serves an investment officer of the district are required to complete training on the investment and collateralization of public funds. Mr. Andruss serves as the investment officer for the district.

Topic 9.10 - Credit Card Account and Routine Expenses

Mr. Andruss provided the following information:

Staff have identified numerous subscription charges on the credit card statements of the district that appeared inappropriate. In response, staff have attempted to contact the associated companies (e.g. ATT) to investigate the charges and ultimately submitted disputes to the credit card company related to those charges.

To improve administrative efficiency and reduce the likelihood of interruption of subscriptions and the District being charged for terminated services such as internet services, phone services, and computer subscription fees, staff intend to use the VCGCD credit card account to pay existing subscription fees and miscellaneous expenses instead of the credit card of the District.

Presently, the District has a credit balance on it credit card account of \$632.94.

Board Action: Mr. Biery moved to authorize the general manager to 1) cancel the credit card account of the District, 2) request payment of the credit owed the District from the credit card, 3) pay regular and routine subscription fees and miscellaneous expenses using the credit card account of VCGCD, and 4) reimburse VCGCD for incurred expenses for RGCD via interlocal agreement invoices. 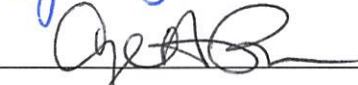

As reported to the Board at the May 9, 2025 meeting, the District submitted two preliminary DFC statements for evaluation by the technical consultant for GMA 15, Intera:

- Scenario 1 - Desired Future Condition for Victoria County expressed as a condition to not exceed an average drawdown of 5 feet in the Gulf Coast Aquifer, +/-3 feet, at the end of year 2080 with the previous pumping distribution used to develop the DFC for Refugio County.
- Scenario 2 - Desired Future Condition for Refugio County expressed as a condition to not exceed an average drawdown of 5 feet in the Chicot and Evangeline Aquifers, combined, +/- 3 feet, at the end of year 2080 with the previous pumping distribution used to develop the DFC for Refugio County unchanged and as a condition to not exceed an average drawdown of 20 feet in the Burkeville and Jasper Aquifers, combined at the end of year 2080 with the previous pumping distribution used to develop the DFC for Refugio County increased to 40,000 acre-feet per year in the southern portion of Refugio County.

During the GMA 15 meeting on July 10, 2025, Intera reported that Scenario 2 (intended to investigate the predicted impacts of significant development (40,000 acre-feet per year) of deep brackish groundwater within Refugio County. Steve Young of Intera informed the representatives, that the request to simulate significant production using the CGC-GAM was not advisable and would yield unrealistic predictions due the limited structure and spatial extent of the deep formations within the model. Intera was instructed to suspend all efforts to simulate deep brackish groundwater production.

A special meeting of GMA 15 has been posted for July 24, 2025. During the meeting, representatives will receive a report from Intera on their effort to assess the utility of the new groundwater availability model (GAM) for joint planning purposes and consider related action, if any, by the representatives including a request for TWDB to use the CGC-GAM for developing Modeled Available Groundwater (MAGs).

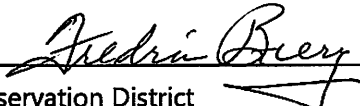

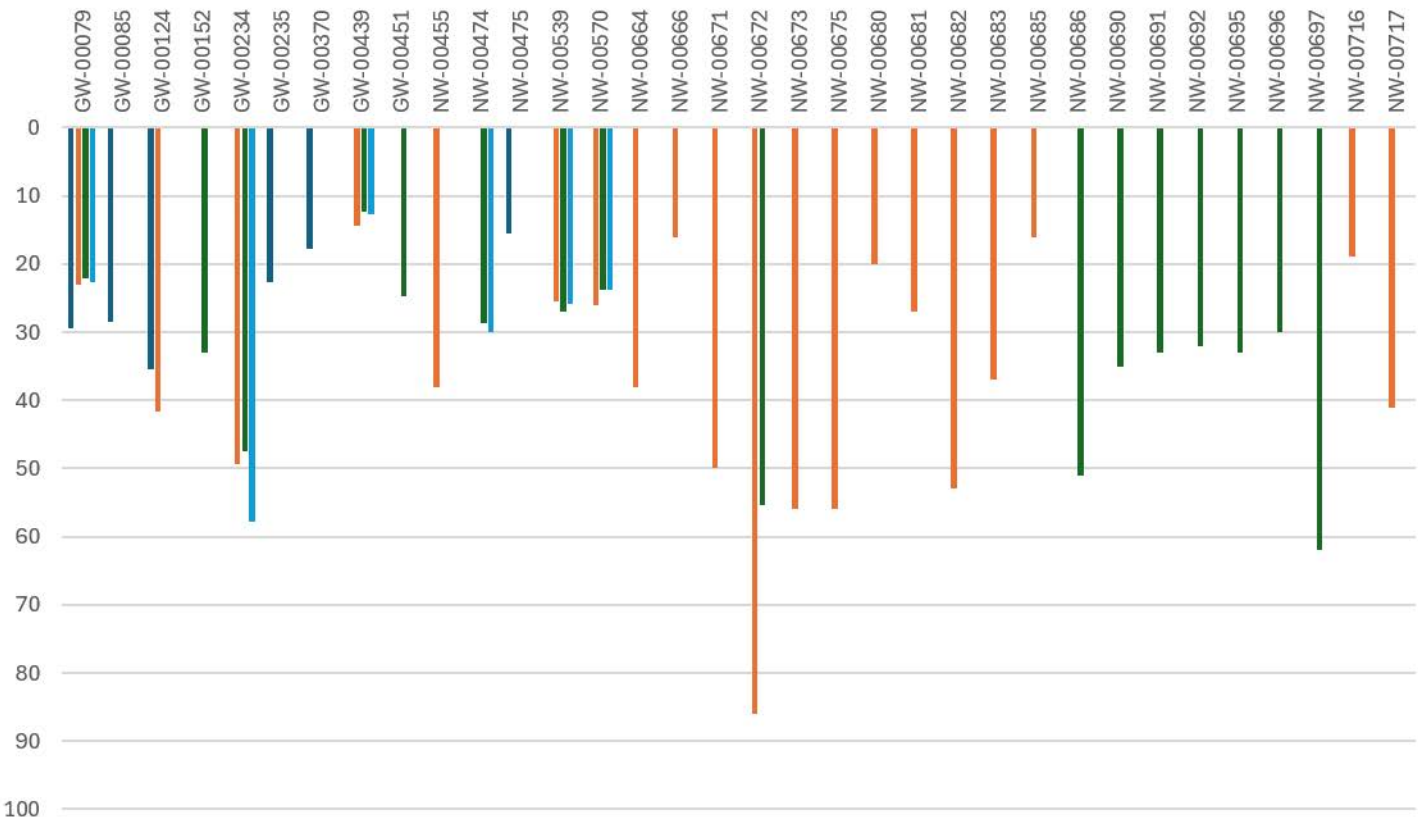

Application of Geostatistical Techniques to Interpret Measured 2024 and 2025 Water Levels

Background

In 2021, INTERA completed a regional geostatistical evaluation of groundwater levels (Young and others, 2021) for:

- Calhoun County Groundwater Conservation District
- Refugio Groundwater Conservation District
- Texana Groundwater Conservation District
- Victoria County Groundwater Conservation District

That study accomplished the following:

1. Compiled measured groundwater elevations from GCD records and the Texas Water Development Board (TWDB) Groundwater Database (GWDB) for 2000–2020 into a unified dataset;
2. Applied geostatistical methods to interpolate annual groundwater elevations in the Chicot and Evangeline aquifers from 2000–2020;
3. Evaluated annual water-level change spatially and at selected wells;
4. Provided recommendations for continued monitoring and analysis.

The geostatistical method used to develop the baseline set of results was an application of ordinary kriging. Kriging is a geostatistical interpolation technique that considers both the distance and the degree of variation between known data points when estimating values in unknown areas. Ordinary Kriging provides the best linear unbiased prediction at unsampled locations and reproduces the measured values at all sampled locations exactly. To meet underlying assumptions that were used to develop ordinary Kriging, the measured water levels were detrended prior to the application of ordinary Kriging. The measured water levels were detrended using water levels simulated by the central Gulf Coast Groundwater Availability Model (GAM) that were smoothed using an algorithm described by Young and others (2021). The method was given the acronym SSWL+KR, which stands for smoothed simulated water levels and Kriged residuals.

SSWL+KR was used to interpolate the water level residuals for the years 2000 through 2026 for both the Chicot Aquifer, the Evangeline Aquifer, and the Chicot and Evangeline Aquifer, which is created by combining the Chicot and Evangeline aquifers into single aquifer. The interpolation generated a continuous water level surface using square grid cells with a resolution of 500 ft. Using these surfaces, the average water levels were calculated by county and by year. For the years 2022 through 2024 (Young, 2022; Young, 2023; Young, 2024), water level datasets

corresponding to the periods 2021–2022, 2022–2023, and 2023–2024 were compiled and used to perform the SSWL+KR analysis across the four GCDs.

Analysis of Water Level Data

Two water level datasets were obtained from the TWDB Groundwater Database and the VCGCD. To reconcile any differences in the data from these sources, wells from previous analyses were compiled and used as a reference to identify corresponding wells in both the VCGCD and TWDB GWDB datasets. New wells were subsequently added to this dataset. Water level data for each well from 2023, 2024, 2025 and 2026 was then averaged to determine a representative water level for analysis years 2024 and 2025. One water level per well was used in the SSLW + KR process.

Table 1 lists the water levels. Figures 1 and 2 show the location of the water levels that were used in the geostatistical analyses. Tables 2 through 5 provide the average value for the annual water levels for Calhoun County GCD, Refugio GCD, Texana GCD and Victoria County GCD from 2000 to 2025 for the Chicot Aquifer, the Evangeline Aquifer, and the combination of the Chicot and Evangeline aquifers. In addition, Tables 2 through 5 also provide the difference in the annual water levels for each year between the year 2000 and each analysis year. Hence, the values for water level change in the columns labeled 2025 represent the water level change from 2000 to 2025.

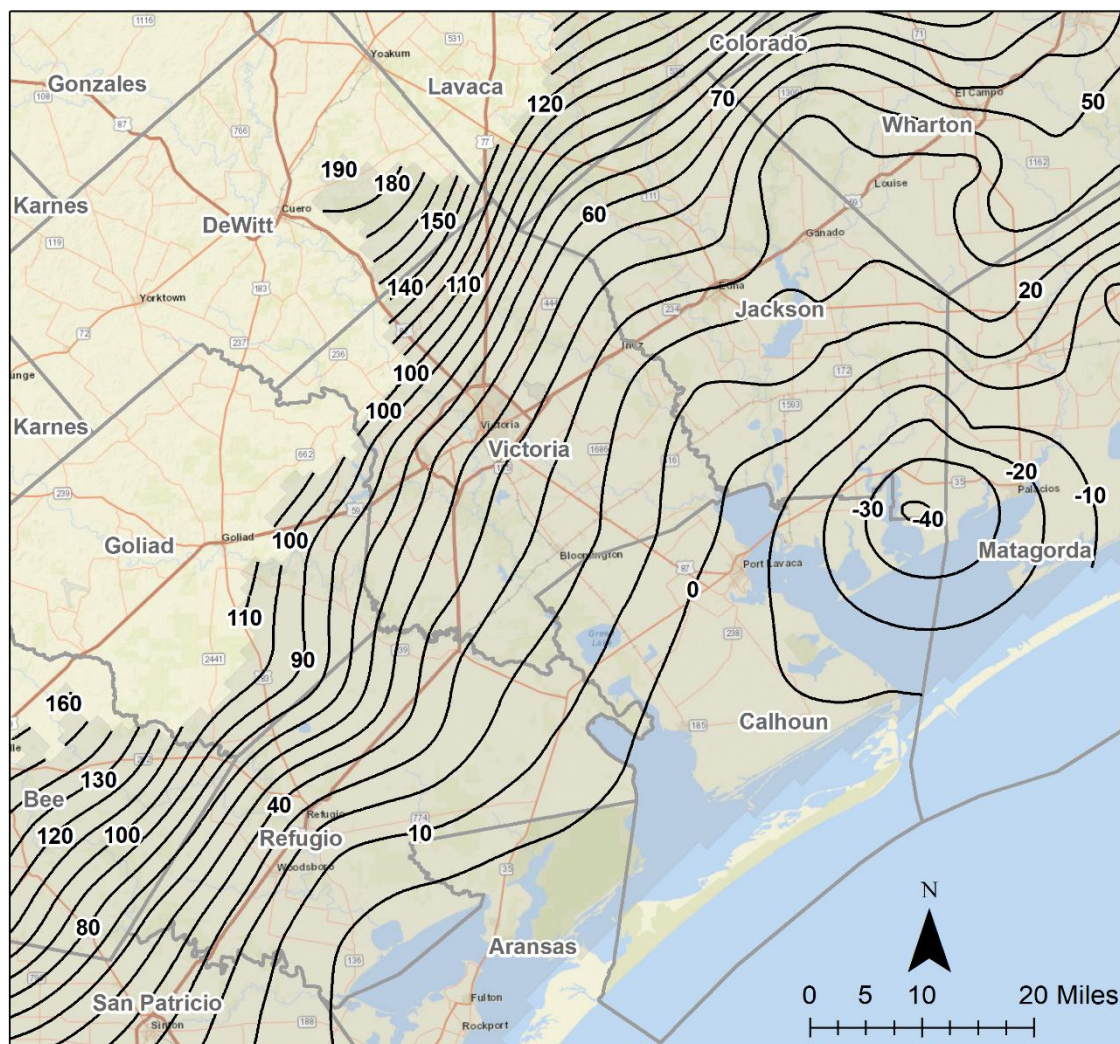
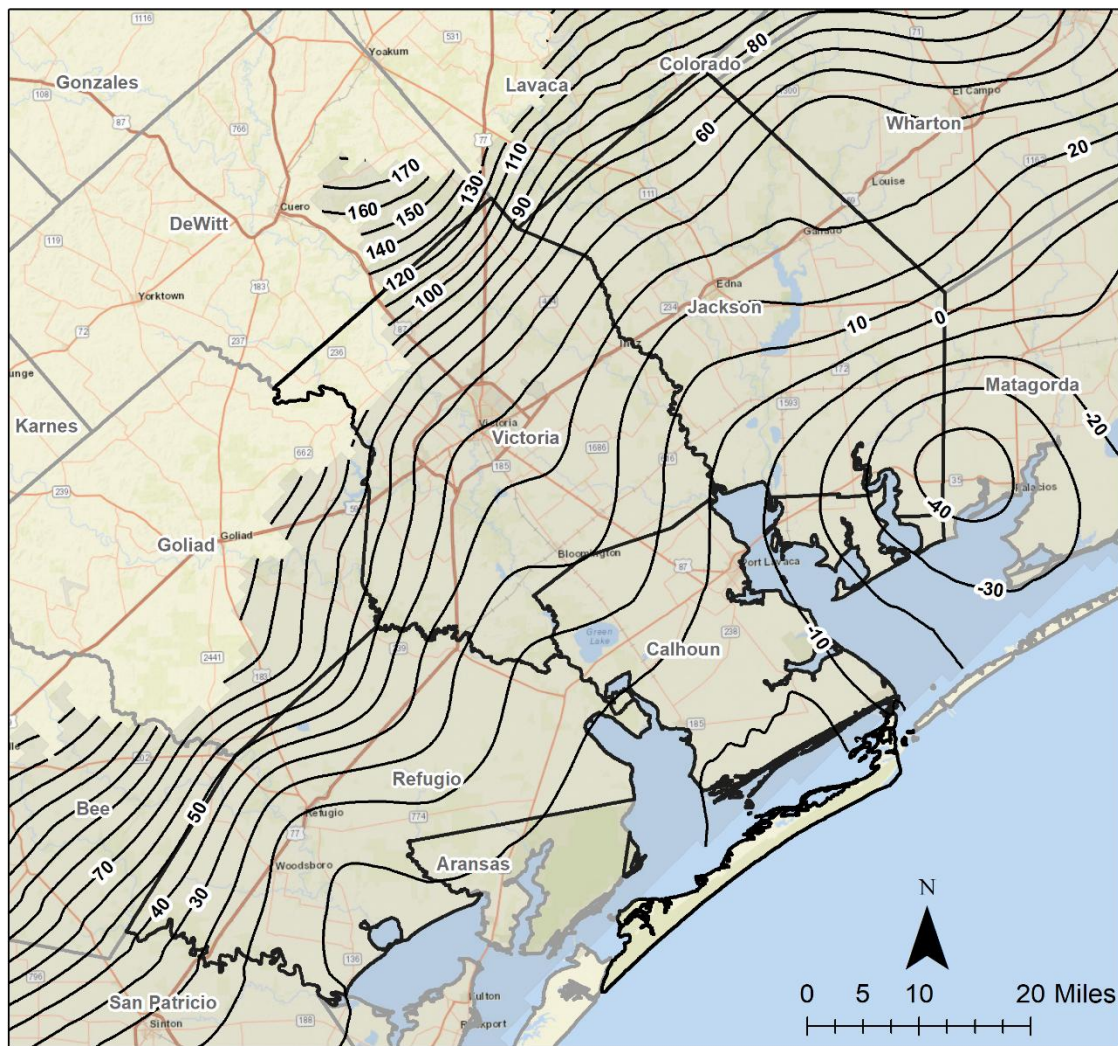
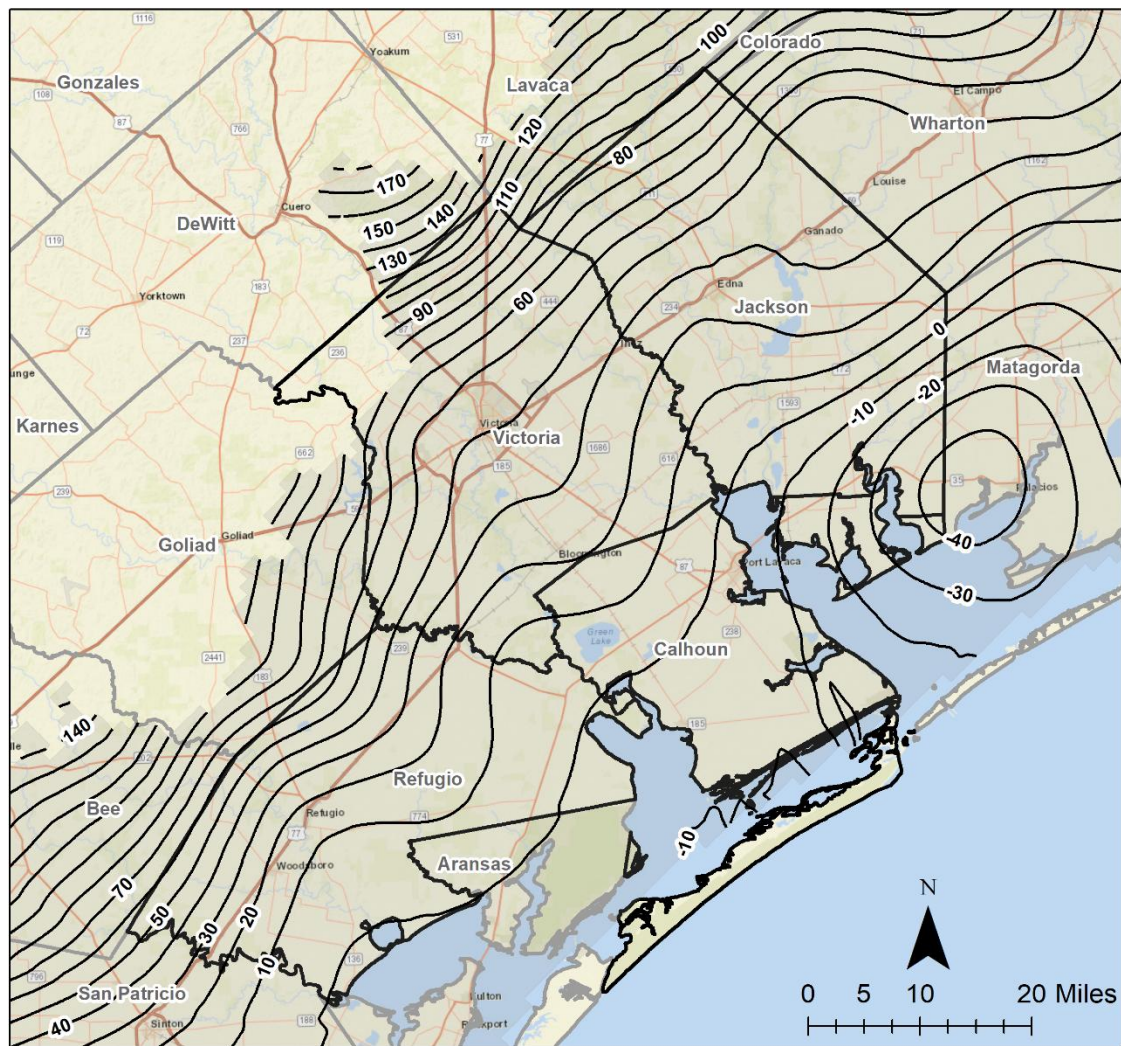


Figure 3 Contours of the Water Levels Generated for the Chicot Aquifer for the 2000 Analysis Year

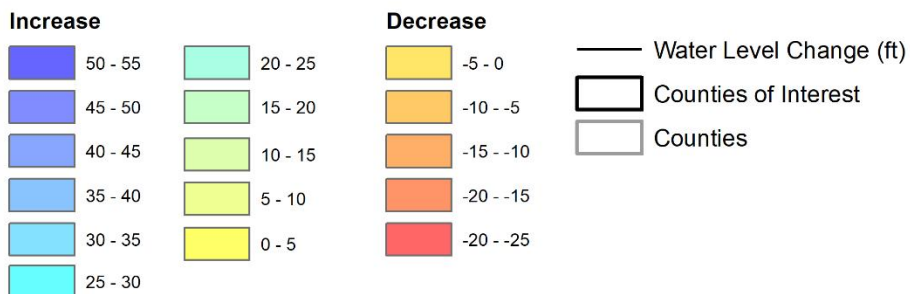
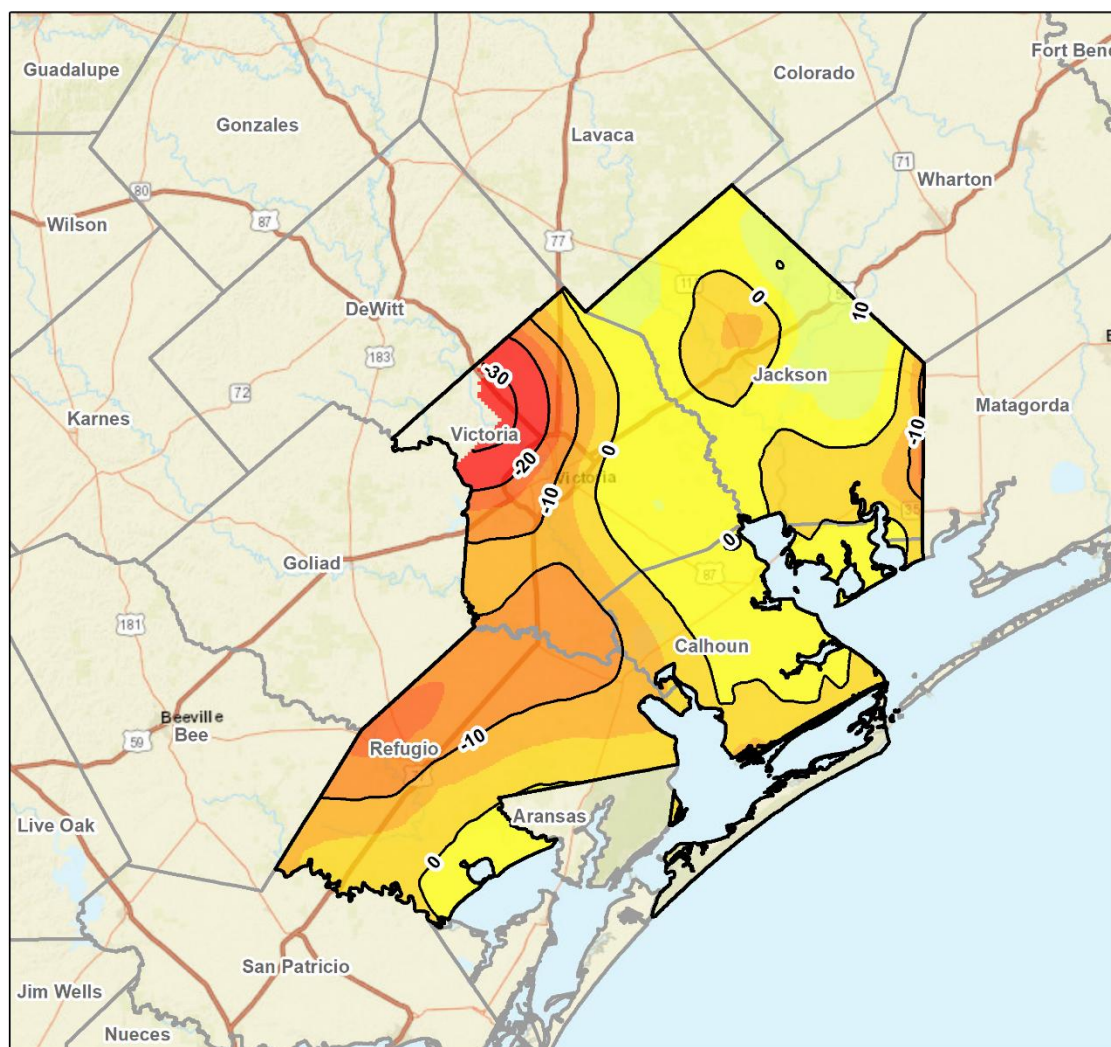


Figure 6 Contours of the change in water levels in the Chicot Aquifer from the 2000 Analysis Year to the 2024 Analysis Year

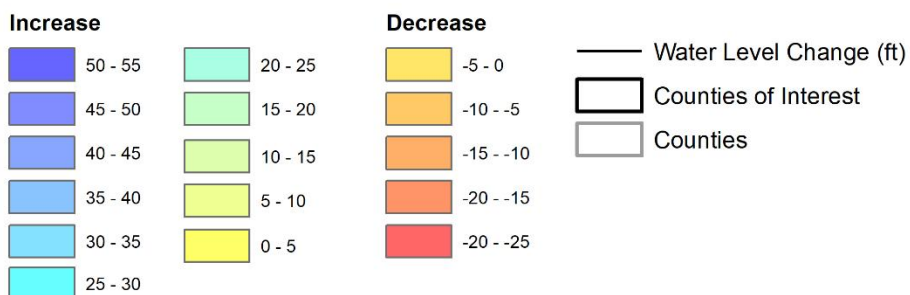


Figure 7 Contours of the change in water levels in the Chicot Aquifer from the 2000 Analysis Year to the 2025 Analysis Year

Figures 3 through 5 show water level contours for the Chicot Aquifer generated for the years 2000, 2024, and 2025, respectively. Figures 6 and 7 provide contours at 10-ft intervals that show the change in water levels from 2000 to 2024 and 2025 for the Chicot Aquifer across Victoria, Jackson, Refugio, and Calhoun counties. Across these four GCDs, the contour intervals range between 10 ft (rebound) and -20 ft (decline).

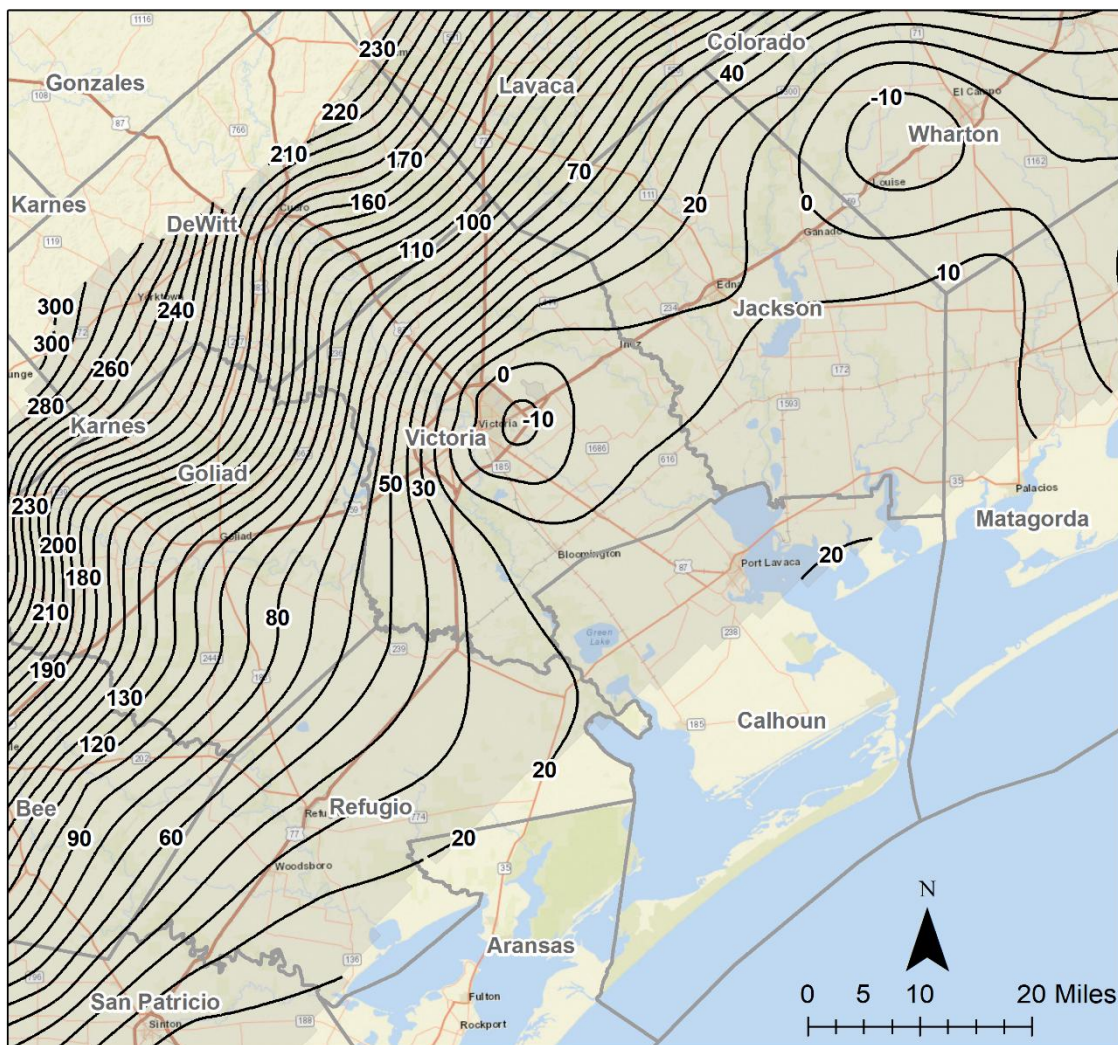
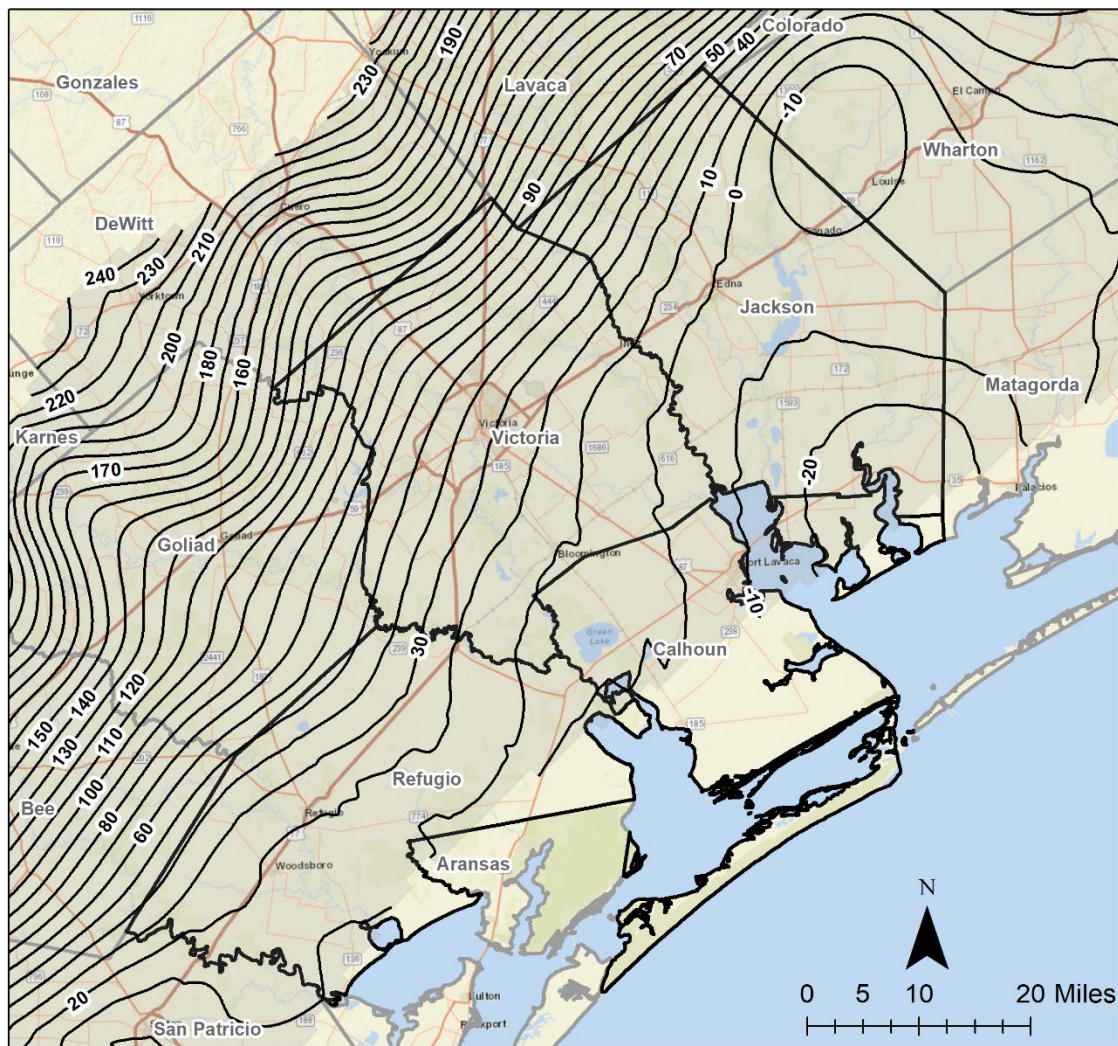


Figure 8 Contours of the Water Levels Generated for the Evangeline Aquifer for the 2000 Analysis Year

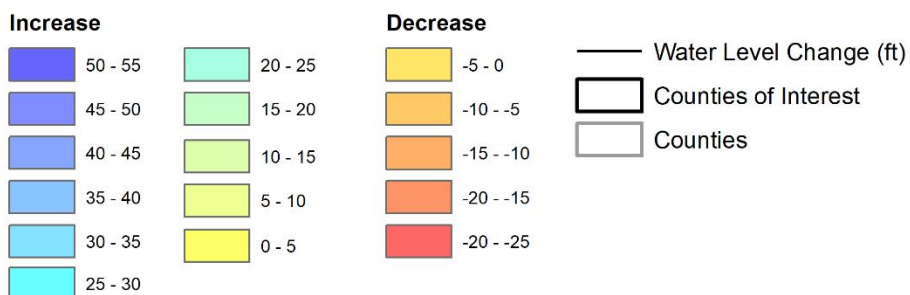
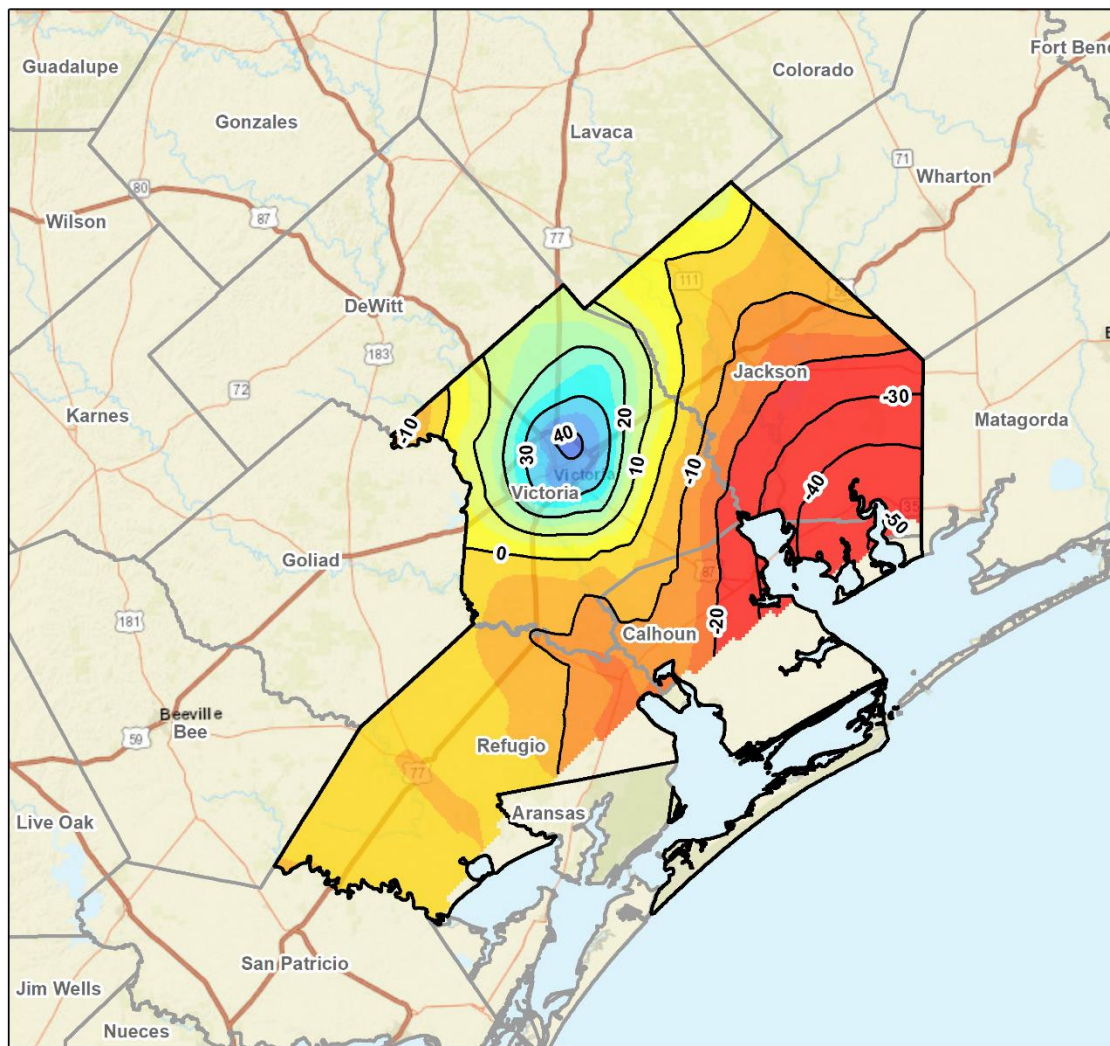


Figure 11 Contours of the change in water levels in the Evangeline Aquifer from the 2000 Analysis Year to the 2024 Analysis Year

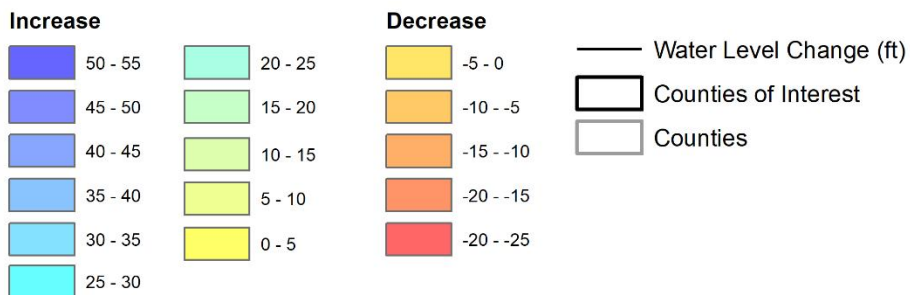


Figure 12 Contours of the change in water levels in the Evangeline Aquifer from the 2000 Analysis Year to the 2025 Analysis Year

Figures 8 through 10 show water level contours for the Evangeline Aquifer generated for the years 2000, 2024 and 2025, respectively. Figures 11 and 12 provide contours of the change in water levels from 2000 to 2023 for the Evangeline Aquifer. Across these four GCDs, the contour intervals range between 50 ft (rebound) and -20 ft (decline). In Figures 3 through 5 and 8 through 10, the areal extent of the Chicot and Evangeline Aquifers in all four counties is based on the representation of the Evangeline Aquifer in the current Groundwater Availability Model (GAM) for GMA 15 developed by Chowdhury and others (2004).

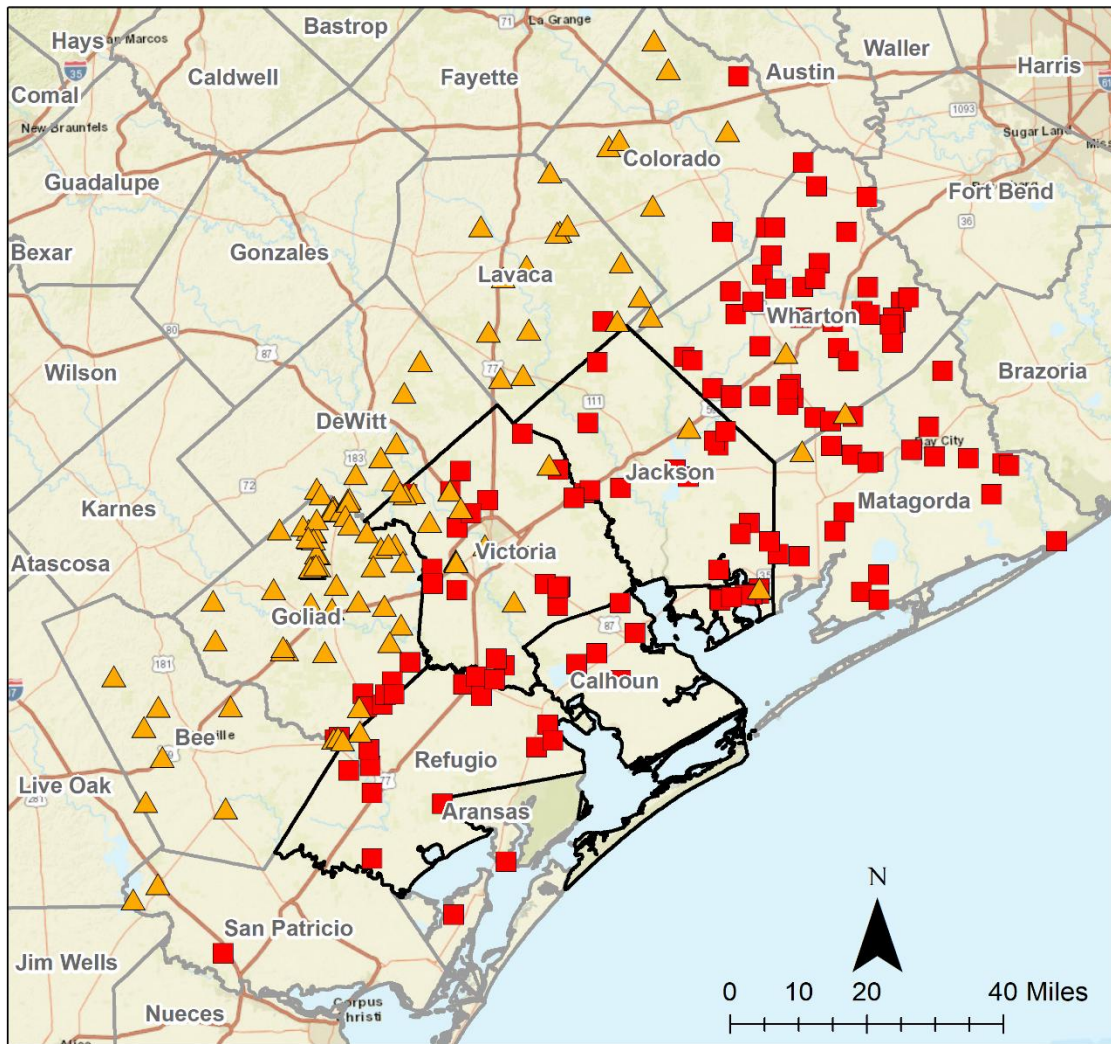

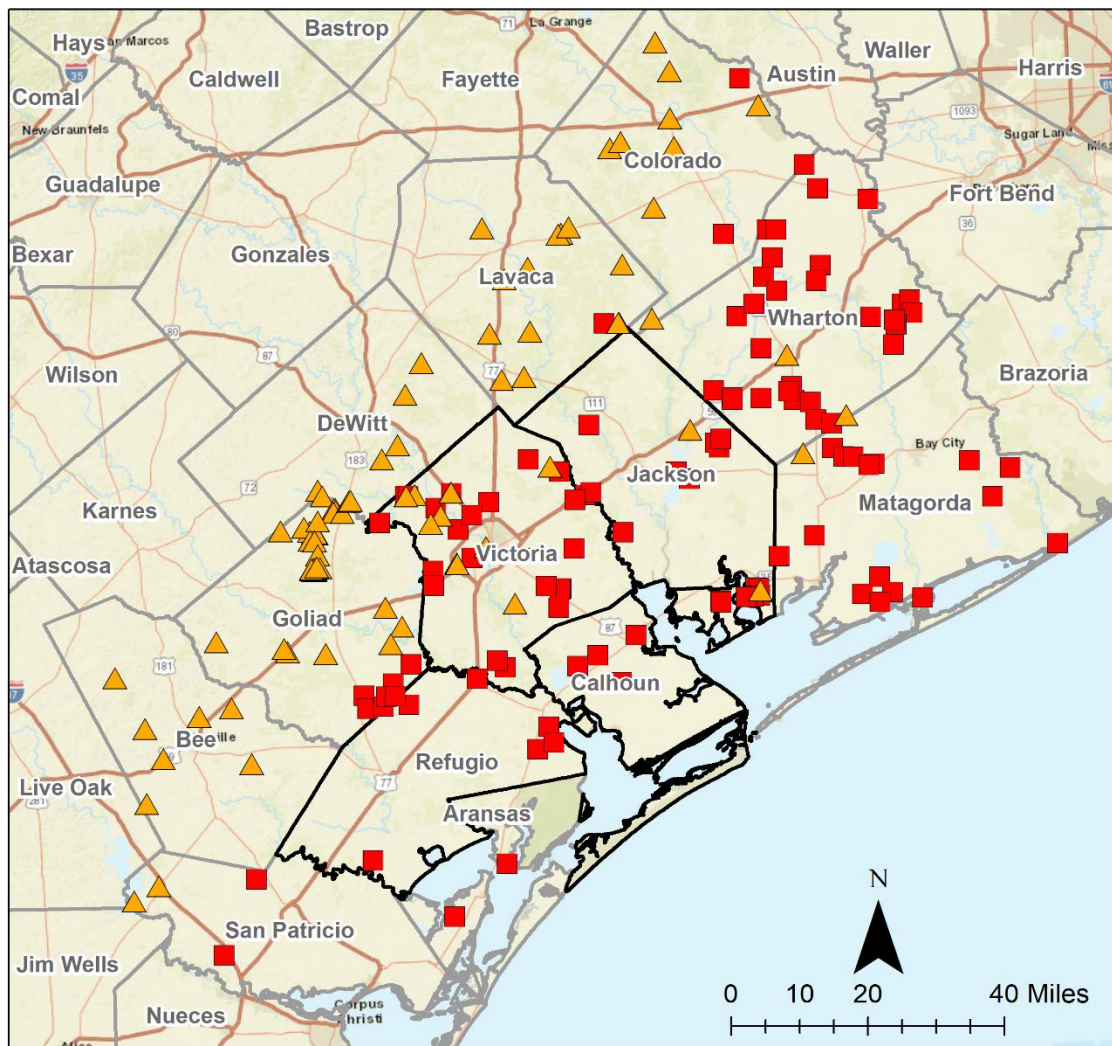

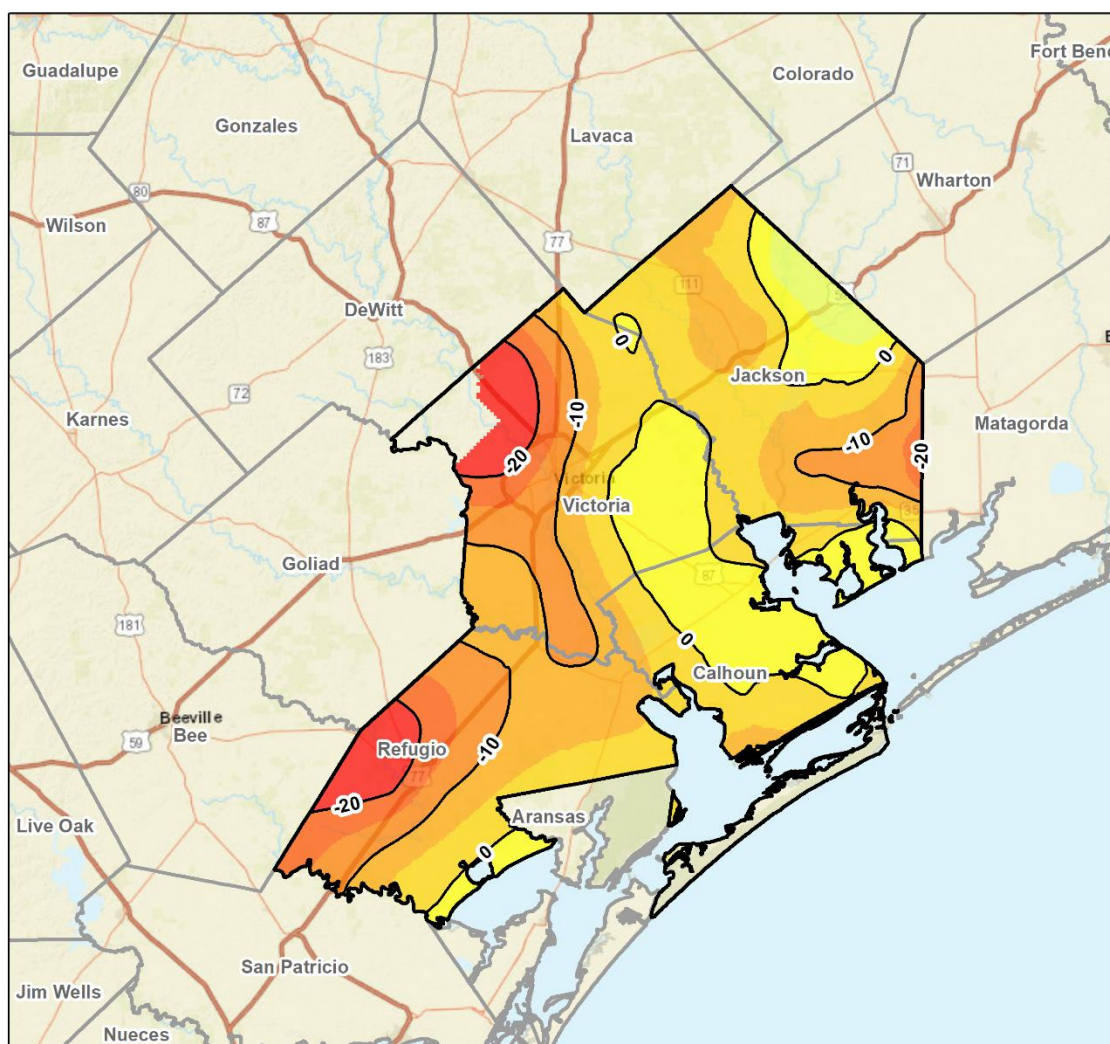

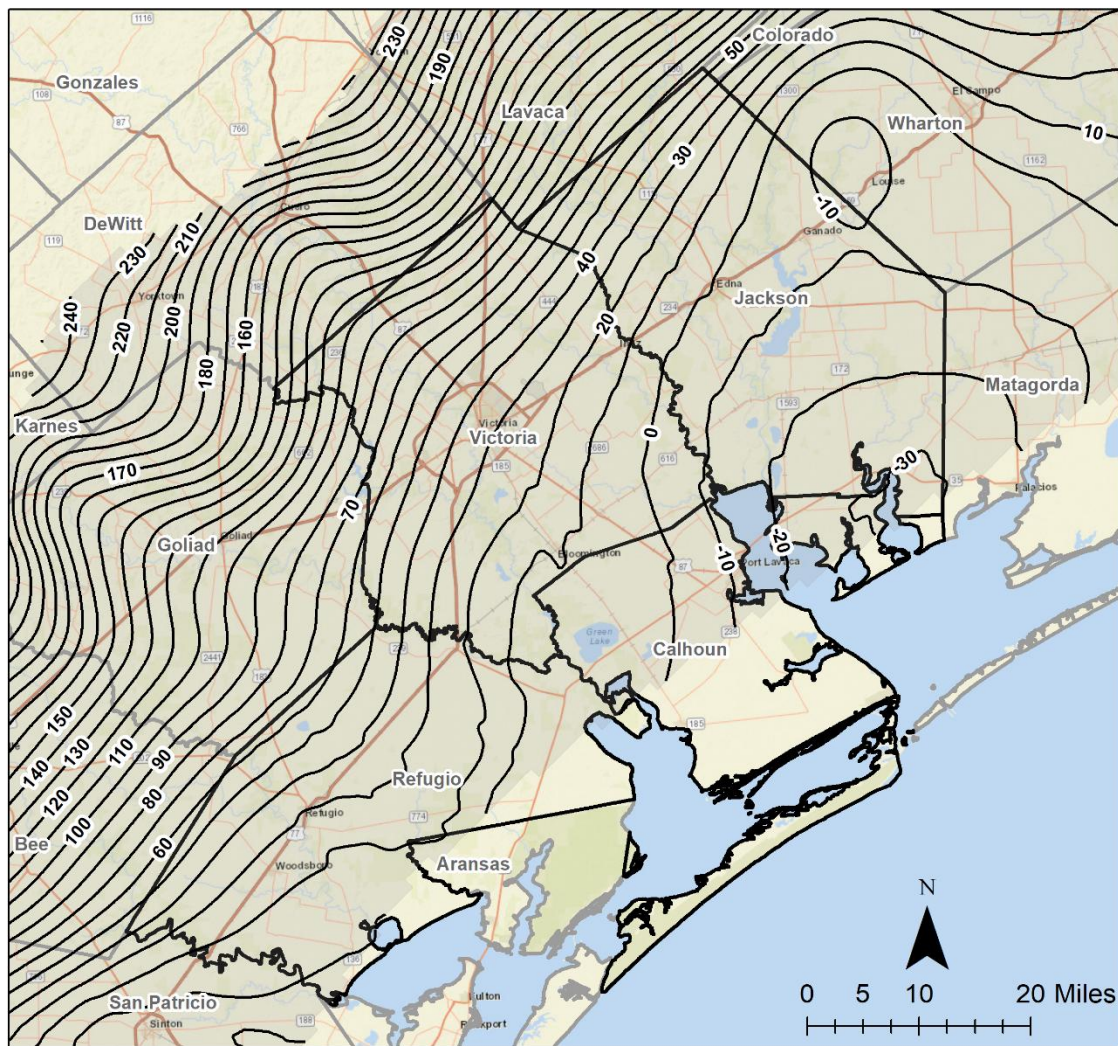

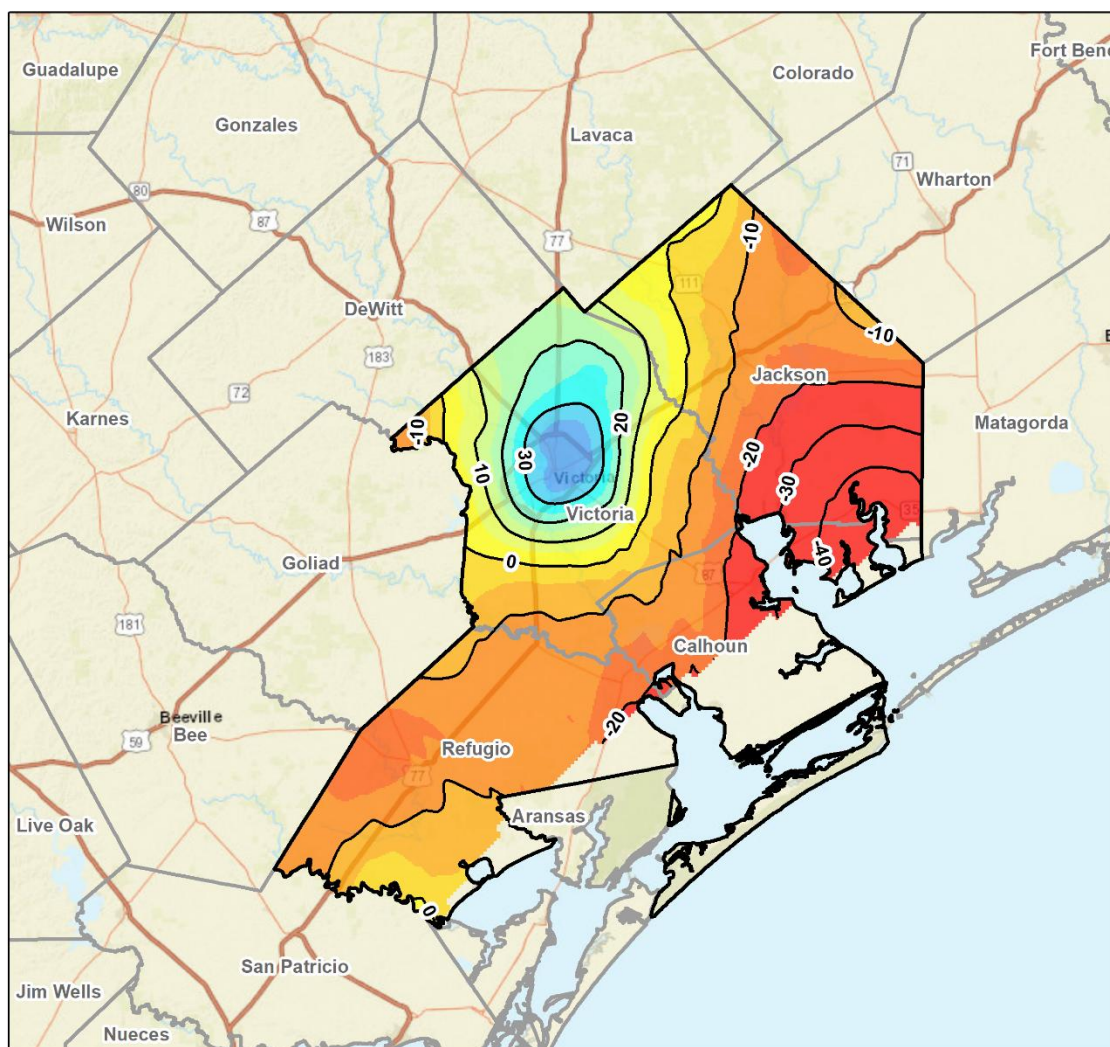

Response to Questions of Concern

Table 1 was compiled and evaluated to investigate several questions regarding spatial patterns and magnitudes of water-level change observed in previous analyses. The review focused on measured data from Analysis Years 2021 through 2025 and assessed how monitoring density and model detrending may have influenced interpolated results.

Question 1

Why did the 2023 analysis show approximately 20 feet of decline in the Chicot Aquifer in Refugio County?

The mapped results for 2023 indicate an area of approximately 20 feet of decline in the Chicot Aquifer within Refugio County. Review of the measured water levels confirms that some wells in Refugio County exhibit a decreasing trend over recent years; however, the magnitude of measured decline does not fully support the extent of change shown on the interpolated surface.

This discrepancy is most likely attributable to the spatial and temporal distribution of pumping represented in the underlying GAM simulation used for detrending. Because the SSWL+KR method relies on residuals calculated relative to the smoothed simulated water-level surface, any misrepresentation of pumping patterns in the model can influence the magnitude and spatial expression of the kriged residuals. In areas with moderate monitoring density, localized residual patterns may amplify model-driven artifacts, resulting in contour magnitudes that exceed the observed well-level trends.

Question 2

Why are water-level declines observed in the Evangeline Aquifer near the intersection of Jackson and Calhoun Counties?

Evaluation of the compiled dataset indicates that no Evangeline water-level measurements were available in Calhoun County for any of the analysis years reviewed (2021–2025), and historical coverage in that aquifer has also been limited. Without direct monitoring control in Calhoun County, the SSWL+KR process cannot calculate local residuals to correct the regional trend represented by the smoothed GAM surface.

As a result, the interpolated water-level surface in this area is driven primarily by:

- The regional simulated trend from the GAM; and
- Residuals calculated from wells located in adjacent counties.

If pumping is inaccurately distributed within the model in this region, those errors are not effectively corrected in areas lacking monitoring wells. Consequently, the observed declines near the Jackson–Calhoun boundary likely reflect limitations in both monitoring density and pumping representation within the model rather than confirmed measured declines within Calhoun County itself.

Question 3

Why don't the rasters cover the southern half of Calhoun County for the Evangeline Aquifer?

The model does not simulate Evangeline Aquifer there so there is no data to detrend in these parts. See the water level contour figures in the above analysis. In light gray is the extent of each aquifer in the GAM.

Questions 4

Why were relatively large Evangeline changes observed in Calhoun County and in Jackson County in 2018?

These questions are addressed by the same underlying data limitation identified in Question 2.

- **Calhoun County:** No Evangeline monitoring wells were available to constrain the interpolation.
- **Jackson County:** Monitoring density was limited (approximately four wells during 2021–2025), resulting in sparse spatial control.

Where monitoring density is low, detrending and kriging are less able to correct for potential inaccuracies in the regional simulated pumping distribution. In these areas, interpolation artifacts and model-driven residual patterns may become more pronounced, leading to mapped changes that exceed what can be directly confirmed from measured data.
